FUNDRAISING TO SUPPORT Janis Prout and Family



One of the many amazing things about living in a small community like Tieri, is how we come together to celebrate each other's good times and support each other during the not-so-good times.

Right now, the Prout family needs our love and support as wife and mum, Janis Prout battles with terminal cancer.

For those of you who don't know Janis, her friend Lisa May describes her as having "a vibrant energy that radiates happiness and laughter to everyone in her presence. You will definitely hear her before you see her! She's the life of the party, her great sense of humour and positive outlook on life is contagious. Janis is the kindest person, who will help you even if she's never met you."

Janis was first diagnosed with a Schwannoma Tumour in 2019. She had her first surgery on 31 August 2020 and after 19 days in hospital recovering, she was sent home.

In April 2021, an MRI scan showed the tumour had started to slowly grow back. By October 2021 Janis was experiencing severe pain. Another scan found a second tumour growing beside the first one, double in size and growing aggressively. She was booked in for surgery, January 2022.

The day prior to the surgery, an MRI showed the tumours had grown rapidly. Whilst the surgery went well, just three weeks later Janis developed breathing pain and was sent in an ambulance to Emerald hospital where they found two more growths and fluid on her lungs. She was airlifted to Townsville hospital to see specialists from Brisbane and discuss treatment options including chemotherapy, radiation and potentially more surgery.

Throughout this time Janis's husband, Brendan, was working to complete his fourth year apprenticeship and support his family financially, all while trying to be by his wife's side and keep as much normality as possible for their three children.

In early February, as the medical bills continued to mount up, Lisa set up a **Go Fund Me page** for the Tieri community to raise funds and support Janis and Brendan with the costs of the medical treatment.

Sadly, this treatment is no longer an option for Janis.

"My hope is that the community will reach deep and do what they can to take just some of the pressure off, so they can enjoy as much time together as a family, creating some magical moments and memories," says Lisa.

At the time of writing, 69 generous donations to the Prout family had been made via the Go Fund Me page, raising a total of \$10,410. Tieri State School held a 'Crazy Hair Day' to raise funds; Tieri Sharks donated profits from their weekly BBQ and the Tieri Pub has also given a lovely donation.

On her Facebook page, Janis writes: "I again just want to thank everyone from the very whole of my heart for all the love and kindness you all have shown our family....The next few months are going to be so very hard on Brendan and the kids but I'm so glad they have wonderful people like you all in their lives. I love you all."

A group of locals have joined together with Kath Hema from CTM Links to raise funds to support Janis and her family during a time of need by organising an event that brings the whole community together. Janis's Colour Splash will be held on Saturday, 14 May from 3-8pm (see flyer for details).

"Our aim is to of course raise money to support the Prouts, however we also want the community to come together for an event filled with fun, laughter and supporting other locals who are holding a market stall," Lisa explains. "Tieri is all about community and I know we can all come together and make this a really successful and enjoyable event."

New Water Feature AT C&K KINDY

Tieri Kindergarten is an integral part of the Tieri community and they take immense pride in offering a safe, fun and engaging environment for children and staff alike.

Key to this is their Community Advisory Group (CAG) made up of parents and interested community members. Last year, in consideration of our climate and the potential to expand on their outdoor education and interaction program, the CAG agreed that the Kindy would benefit from a new water feature.

Bodies of water offer endless opportunities for physical experiments and discoveries," explains Barbara Wade, Kindy Teacher and Director.

"Children may have already investigated wood, dirt, sand, rocks, and other dry substances. But what happens when these substances are mixed, sifted, or dropped with water? Children also get the opportunity to think about concepts like water displacement and volume as they explore in a body of water. Water supports a variety of life forms like fish and frogs, so water play can lead to new biological adventures as wel!!"

Quinten Abell, a parent from the Kindy and an active CAG member, kindly offered to build the water feature.

He researched different styles and types online and presented these designs to the Group for feedback. Barbara provided further input to ensure it was suitable for use in both play and education.

Collectively, the CAG agreed on a three-tiered solid wood water table which compliments our natural environment beautifully. The feature includes a tub at the bottom and a mixer tap at the top.

With the design ready, Quinten gave up his time over the summer to construct the new feature so it was ready to be unveiled at the start of Term 1 on February 10th.

"We had a big reveal on the first day back at Kindy to thank the Abell family for all their hard work. The children were so excited about using a unique water table and were super keen to try it out," reflects Barbara.



"Our staff are all extremely happy and appreciative as the water feature adds another dimension to their teaching and to the children's learning; and this year's parents are impressed and grateful that their child will reap the benefits. We couldn't be happier - it has far exceeded our expectations, thank you Quinten and the CAG!"

Tieri Family Unit and Child Health Centre has provided the Tieri Community with services by Sue Hall - registered nurse, Midwife, Child Health Nurse, Immunisation Provider Nurse and Triple P facilitator - for the last 22 years.

When I came to Tieri with my babies, I felt cared for by Brownyn, the Child Health nurse who was at the Centre back then. I decided that I wanted to give back to families and started my university studies to become a Child Health Nurse," explains Nurse Sue.

"This has been the most rewarding profession anyone could do. I have had the pleasure of seeing parents to be, grow and love their babies, toddlers, children. Unlike other Child Health Centres, I get to do it all and therefore I feel a real connection with my families and this community. When the time comes for me to leave, it will be that hardest thing I will ever do."

The Health Centre offers a wide variety of free services provided by Queensland Health. Whether you are new in town or have called Tieri home for a while, it's worth knowing the range of services available for you, your family and our community.

Covid-19 Vaccination Services

Covid vaccination clinics are currently held at the Health Centre during the first week of each month, for one day. A visiting vaccination team comes to the Central Highlands and visits a variety of towns to allow people easy access to a vital vaccination which saves lives. For more information about the Covid Vaccination clinics, please phone 4984 8366.

Sue and the team endeavour to provide a safe service to everyone, as per the Qld Health Guidelines. To allow maximum protection for everyone visiting the Centre, specific days are allocated for patients

or parents who are unvaccinated. And remember, you can help to keep our community protected by rescheduling your appointment if you are feeling unwell.

Other Services

- Antenatal Care and Education by the Midwife for Private and Public Clients: Tieri works closely with Emerald Hospital. The Centre offers Midwifery clinics where your pregnancy progress and questions are discussed checked with blood pressure, urine tests and listening to your foetus. Antenatal Education has been proven to be very beneficial to mothers and fathers, in understanding the differences to a midwifery or a medical birth. These education sessions are held on an individual basis, to ensure your specific questions are addressed. Antenatal Education sessions are also held in Emerald Hospital on a Tuesday evening.
- Postnatal Care: for the first 8 weeks for mothers. An extended
 Midwifery Service for clients who discharge prior to Day 7
 after the birth of their baby. Home visits are done for mothers
 and babies after discharge for clients in Tieri and Capella and
 surrounding properties. Please phone as soon as you are home
 or discharging from hospital to arrange a home visit to ensure
 your questions about your precious baby are answered.
- Well Baby Clinic: initial home visits are offered for all clients, followed by parents attending the Clinic in Tieri. All Parents are encouraged to visit the Tieri Clinic for fine and gross motor developmental assessments when their babies are 2, 4, 6, 9, 12 and 18 months old, and then when their children are 2, 3, 4, and 5 years of age.
- Speech Assessments: are done at the 3-year-old development assessment, or earlier if parents are concerned.
- Hearing and Vision Assessments: are available when children
 have their 4- and 5-year developmental assessments as part of
 the Well Baby Clinic. An 'Ages and Stages Questionnaire' is sent
 to parents prior to the appointment for completion at home with
 your child.



- **Positive Parenting Program:** individual, group and seminar sessions are all available, for FREE, at the Tieri Centre.
 - Individual sessions address specific issues such as tantrums, toilet training and sleep
 - Group sessions run once a year, over 4 sessions
 - Seminar sessions are held towards the end of the year. The
 3 sessions cover the building block essentials for children.
 Classes are advertised on the <u>Tieri Noticeboard Facebook</u>
 page, the Tieri Noticeboard near the Tieri Pharmacy, and the
 Capella Noticeboard near the Capella News Agency.
- Immunisation Clinic: held on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month, between 9am to 10am. The Immunisation Clinic is free for everyone from birth to 100 years old. Clients from rural areas or other towns can make appointments for immunisation and developmental assessments on other days. Free Flu vaccinations are available all year round.
- Well Women's Nurse (from Rockhampton): this visiting service
 comes to Tieri twice a year to do cervical screening (Papsmear),
 discuss contraception, fertility issues, menopause, and any other
 women's health needs in general. The next visit will be on
 26th and 27th April. To book your appointment, call 4984 8366.
- Dressings and Removal of Sutures, etc.: these can be carried out at the Centre, free of charge on a need-by-need basis.
- Referrals: the Health Centre is able to provide referrals to a wide variety of health services in Emerald, Rockhampton, Mackay. Simply make an appointment to discuss your concerns and Sue will endeavour to help find a solution.
- Video Conferencing Services: are available for clients with specialists based in Qld.

For years, the Tieri Family Unit and Child Health Centre had a playground on site for kids to play on during their visits.

"It made trips to the Centre feel less scary for them," says Nurse Sue. "They used to love playing on it before and after their appointment or whilst they waited for mum or dad."

Unfortunately, after years of use, the playground died last year.

In true Tieri spirit, word got around and soon enough Cheryl Tabone and the team at the Tieri Brolga Hotel had set up a fundraising event to raise money for the Centre to buy a new playground.

"Thanks to the generosity of our community, they raised \$750 - it was incredible," said Sue.

In January, the Centre used the money to purchase a brand

new wooden frame with steps leading up to a fire engine red bell and a sunshine yellow slide. On the side of the frame, is a swing complete with a safety bar.

Over the course of five hours on 10th February, local Tieri residents, Craig Walker and Darrell Hall, constructed the new equipment in the grounds of the Health Centre.

Then came the all-important test: the first use of the playground! And it was smiles of approval from 2-year-old Kelsey Booth, who christened the equipment during a visit to the Health Centre with her mum and baby brother from a rural property 60km away, near Capella.

Portable Play Therapy COMES TO TIERI

Portable Play Therapy (portableplaytherapy.org) offers Child-Centred Play Therapy (CCPT) for children aged two to 11 years who are experiencing social, emotional and relational challenges.

Play therapy is a form of therapy that uses play to uncover and deal with psychological issues, in particular for child counselling and early intervention during stages of a child's life that can be difficult or even painful.

"One area we've had great success in is helping children make the transition from day care to kindy and kindy to school," says Bernadette (Berine) Ryan, Founder of Portable Play Therapy.

"These can be challenging times for any child, but especially for those with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD). They can have difficulty concentrating during class, find it hard to fit in and establish meaningful friendships. This can often result in behavioural issues.

These behavioural issues are often the child's way of communicating that something isn't right - they just don't have the vocabulary to articulate it in language, so it comes out in other ways.

We use play therapy to first help the child identify what triggers them and then to improve their self-management skills and boost their emotional intelligence so they can develop coping strategies to regulate how they react to what's going on around them."

Play therapy builds on a child's inner resources and strengths to bring about developmental growth and healing. It helps children develop confidence and positive self-esteem, find healthier ways of communicating and can promote resilience and coping, in ways that are appropriate to their age and developmental stage.



According to Healthline.com, there are many potential benefits of play therapy including taking more responsibility for certain behaviours, creative problem-solving skills, greater self-respect, increased empathy and respect for others, alleviation of anxiety, and stronger social skills.

Before therapy commences, Bernie invites parents or primary carers to a FREE one-hour consultation without the child. During this time, you openly discuss your worries and concerns about the child's behaviours and relationships with others. A full developmental history of the child and family is explored and the play therapy process, fees and practical considerations are all discussed.

From there, a program is developed consisting of Play Therapy sessions and Parent/Carer Consultation sessions. The process normally lasts about six months or longer depending on the circumstances.

Session fees start at \$150 + GST per hour and will vary depending on age and area and whether the service is private or through NDIS.

SHARING YOUR VOICE Directly Benefits Our Community

Since 2020, Glencore has engaged research company, Voconiq, to help get feedback from communities neighbouring their Oaky Creek Coal operation about what is important to you.

Voconiq's "Local Voices" community engagement program involves a series of confidential community surveys based on research conducted by Australia's national science agency, CSIRO. The aim of the Local Voices program is to improve engagement between Glencore Oaky Creek Coal and the community living in Tieri and surrounds by increasing understanding and generating better relationships and outcomes.

The first survey of the series, the 'anchor' survey, was undertaken at the end of 2020 followed by the first 'pulse' survey in July 2021. The second, most recent, 'pulse' survey was conducted from 6 December 2021 to 31 January 2022.

Participation in the Local Voices surveys not only helps Glencore shape decisions that affect our community, it also directly *rewards* the community. How? For every 'anchor' survey that was completed, a \$10 was made to a local not-for-profit community group and, for every 'pulse' survey that's completed, a \$5 donation is made.

To date, **over 352** community members have provided their 'local voice' by completing the survey. This has resulted in **over \$2,300** being donated to local community groups including Capricorn Helicopter Rescue Service, Central Highlands Wildlife Carers, Tieri Sharks Swimming Club, Peak Downs Karate, Tieri Possums Playgroup, Tieri Family Unit & Child, Health Centre, Tieri State School P&C, and CTM LINKS.

Have you spotted an issue in Tieri and wondered how to alert the relevant authorities?

Reporting local issues is easy thanks to the Snap, Share, Solve app!

The free app provides you with an easy and efficient way to notify local councils, utilities or other authorities of issues that need addressing in the community. It's used by a number of local councils and authorities across Australia and New Zealand, including here at the Central Highlands Regional Council.

The type of incidents you can report include illegal parking, dumped rubbish, overgrown vegetation, graffiti and vandalism, trip hazards, potholes, and abandoned cars or trolleys.

Reporting an issue couldn't be easier, just follow these simple steps:

- 1 Confirm your location
- Select the incident type from the menu of options
- 3 Take a photo
- 4 Fill out any notes or additional fields
- **5** Hit send to report the issue!

The app uses GPS technology so the council can pinpoint the exact location of the problem which makes it much easier - and quicker - to resolve. The relevant council or authority will receive your report, become aware of the issue and can take the necessary action to fix it.

So, if you've spotted an issue in Tieri, then it's time to snap, share and help solve, in just 30 seconds.

Once you've submitted an issue to the appropriate authority via the Snap, Send, Solve app, you'll receive a direct response to confirm receipt of your report...and you can feel confident that you've played a vital role in keeping our top little town in tip-top shape!

In the Local Voices Anchor and Pulse surveys, as a community you have made it clear that you'd like to hear more about the work Glencore is doing to rehabilitate the land on which Oaky Creek Coal operates.

Progressively rehabilitating land is a core focus of the Oaky Creek Coal Environment and Community team, so Tieri News spoke to Kate French, Environment & Community Advisor, to find out more...

WHAT EXACTLY IS LAND REHABILITATION?

Land rehabilitation is the process of returning the land that's been disturbed by mining activities to an approved post-mining land use. Rehabilitation techniques can involve recontouring the land with earthmoving equipment such as dozers and scrapers; returning topsoil that's been stripped and stockpiled prior to disturbance, ripping, fertilising and seeding the land with native species of grasses, shrubs and trees.

WHY IS LAND REHABILITATION IMPORTANT?

Land rehabilitation is not only an important step in the mining process and a key condition of the mining site's approval to mine in that area, it's also important for the environment and for the local community.

WHAT PROCESSES OR TECHNIQUES DO YOU ADOPT TO REHABILITATE THE LAND?

The land rehabilitation technique used will vary according to the level of disturbance that's taken place. For example, exploration drill pads require a different rehabilitation technique compared to opencut spoil dumps or tailings storage facilities.

HOW MUCH LAND DOES OAKY CREEK COAL AIM TO REHABILITATE EVERY YEAR AND WHAT MILESTONES HAVE YOU REACHED?

Every year, Oaky Creek Coal sets disturbance and rehabilitation targets based on the mine plan. This enables the site to adequately invest budget and allocate the necessary resources. It's important that land rehabilitation is an ongoing, continuous process throughout the life of the mine, not simply an after-thought after the mine has closed.

In 2021, we set a target of seeding 306 hectares of new land and applying for certification of 385 hectares of established rehabilitation. We're excited to report that we exceeded both of these targets, achieving 313 hectares of seeded land, and 559 hectares certified!

Oaky Creek Coal is pleased to report that for the past three years, over 300 hectares of land was seeded per year - that's equivalent to approximately 300 football fields every year!

Oaky Creek Coal's rehabilitation program dates back several decades and includes a number of areas which have obtained certification level.

HOW CAN YOU TELL IF THE LAND HAS BEEN SUCCESSFULLY REHABILITATED?

Rehabilitated land is monitored on a regular basis. Monitoring techniques include a number of different activities such as vegetation assessments, soil sampling, ground and drone surveys. Analogue (native/undisturbed) control sites are also monitored and used as a baseline for rehabilitation monitoring. Water quality is also monitored across the site, including groundwater and surface creek flows, upstream and downstream.

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER THE LAND IS REHABILITATED - WHAT IS IT USED FOR?

Rehabilitated land will continue to be monitored and once it has matured, the site will undergo an independent certification process. Upon completion, the rehabilitated land will be returned to the agreed post-mining land use, for example grazing land for animals or native vegetation.

WHAT LAND REHABILITATION ACTIVITY CAN WE EXPECT FROM OAKY CREEK COAL IN THE FUTURE?

In addition to our regular, ongoing land rehabilitation activities, Oaky Creek Coal is currently developing a Progressive Rehabilitation and Closure Plan (PRCP) in accordance with the Environmental Protection Act 1994 (EP Act). As part of this process, and in line with guidelines set out by the Department of Environment and Science, Oaky Creek Coal will be engaging members of the local community in a consultation regarding the rehabilitation and closure of the site. This community consultation enables relevant stakeholders to be involved in the development of the PRCP. The consultation process is scheduled to take place over the coming months with the final PRCP due for submission later in the year.





GLENCORE AND TIERI STATE SCHOOL Engage for Student Success

Tieri State School has partnered with Glencore to secure important STEM funding for local school students.

The 2022 'Engaging for Success' partnership aims to increase the academic and behavioural engagement of students in their learning, in order to improve their academic achievement, particularly in Science, Technologies and Mathematics (STEM).

Through this partnership and investment from Glencore, the school has been able to purchase four state of the art touch boards for each of their classrooms. They arrived on Thursday, 17 February to the delight of students and teachers alike.

We asked Tieri State School Principal, Jennifer Farquhar, to tell us more about how the touch boards can help engage students for success in STEM education.

AS PRINCIPAL, WHY ARE YOU SO PASSIONATE ABOUT STEM EDUCATION FOR TIERI STUDENTS?

A key driver in education is creating 21st century learners. STEM education is a vital part of this process. STEM offers possibilities for students to be critical and creative thinkers. It develops their Information Communication skills and embraces a positive and useful platform to engage with technology. It takes students beyond screen time to a springboard for learning.

STEM education enables our students to develop solutions to complex problems by providing them with literacies and capabilities that will help them succeed in a world of technological change. Tieri may be a small regional town, but our students are still future innovators, educators, researchers and leaders - it's important that they develop the skills required to compete on a global scale.

WHAT IS A TOUCH BOARD AND WHY DID YOU WANT TO INVEST IN THEM FOR THE SCHOOL?


A touch board is a digital tool that enhances collaboration and engagement, and encourages discussion and ideas in our classrooms. Students today have access to all types of technologies however, most of the time, they engage in social networking and gaming. Technologies can bring the whole world into the classroom, extending students' understanding and stretching their capabilities. Touch boards enable us to do that. Having a touch board in each classroom helps us to create a mobile STEM Space that provides our students with access to online learning at their fingertips...literally.

WHAT HAS BEEN THE FEEDBACK FROM TEACHERS?

Without exception, each teacher has expressed gratitude both verbally and through the excitement in their faces. For teachers, the most valuable and important resource is our students, so to be able to have access to a tool that helps those students to learn is amazing.

HOW HAVE THE STUDENTS REACTED?

There were audible gasps of excitement as the touch boards were wheeled into the classrooms! Their immediate engagement with them really augurs well for their future learning. As is always the

way, our students (even our youngest) have already outstripped the capabilities of the rest of us in learning how to navigate the touch board and its functionalities. And that's just the way we want it! Our goal is to have students eager to learn and to use technologies, to improve achievement through engagement. With these touch boards, we are well on the way.

WHAT DIFFERENCE DO YOU BELIEVE THE TOUCHBOARDS WILL MAKE IN THE TEACHING OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE, AND THE DAY-TO-DAY EDUCATION AND ENGAGEMENT OF THE STUDENTS?

From a teaching perspective, the practicalities and efficiencies offered by the touch board mean that the step from planning to implementation is seamless. The functionality of the board means that it can be used as a write-on screen, an interactive panel, it can connect wirelessly to devices, and combine multiple peripherals into one. Teachers have a whole new toolkit to present content to their classes and a whole new range of learning objects to help engage the different learning styles of their students.

For students, this means that on a daily basis they will have the capacity to engage visually, kinaesthetically and audibly with their education. They'll have opportunities to use the technology to learn as a class, in groups or as individuals; to collaborate with peers to create information and data; to present findings or projects; to quickly organise information into T-Charts; Venn diagrams and graphs; to sign into class; event to connect with Japanese lessons. The opportunities are absolutely endless and we're all looking forward to leveraging them.

This couldn't have been achieved without Glencore's support of the school through the grants processes - it's greatly appreciated. Their connection with Tieri State School to help our students engage for success is exciting and a relationship we look forward to growing across the course of the partners. To Glencore, a big



Health & Wellbeing Program - 'Active Lifestyle' Reimbursement

All Glencore employees and full-time equivalent contractors can apply for the **Health and Wellbeing Program.** Upon successful completion of the program the following will be rewarded:

- For Glencore employees: 100% cost of membership and 5 x doctor appointments. However payments will vary case to case depending on whether it is related to their medical health (charged to Glencore) or their lifestyle (charged to the patient).
- For full-time equivalent (FTE) contractors: 50% cost of membership and 5 x doctor appointments. However payments will vary case to case depending on whether it is related to their medical health (charged to Glencore) or their lifestyle (charged to the patient).

- Annual membership at the Tieri Recreation Centre and Tieri Swimming Pool, or
- An annual membership for either the Tieri Recreation Centre or Tieri Swimming Pool.

Conditions for reimbursement include:

- · You must be employed by Oaky Creek Coal
- · Only one claim per year
- Retain your receipt from Town Services and fill out a reimbursement form

- · RAT test numbers will be monitored closely
- NOTE: You are required to self-test prior to accessing the site on the first day of tour.

IF YOU TEST POSITIVE:

- Report to Qld Health (www.qld.gov.au/rat-positive)
- Follow Qld Health directions regarding isolation and medical care. (www.qld.gov.au/health/conditions/health-alerts/ coronavirus-covid-19/)
- Forward text/email from Qld Health of your positive result to HR at oakycreekhr@glencore.com.au
- You do not need to send a photo of the RAT to HR
- Notify Comms of your absence.



IF YOU TEST NEGATIVE:

- You may access the site or mess without proof of a negative test result
- If you start to feel sick, notify your supervisor and complete another RAT test immediately
- You are not permitted to access the site or the mess if you have cold/flu symptoms OR are regarded as a close contact.

A special mention to the team at Tieri Medical Practice for all their hard work during the RAT testing period conducted from January through to March 2022, thank you for helping to keep our community safe.

HOW YOU CAN HELP STOP THE SPREAD

- Being vaccinated will help protect you from severe disease. To book your COVID-19 vaccination, call Tieri Medical Practice on 07 4984 8386.
- Continue to practice COVID-safe behaviours such as wearing a face mask, maintaining good hand hygiene, checking in, and social distancing.
- If you get COVID-19, you need to immediately self-isolate at your home, or other accommodation for 7 days from the date you had your test. Isolate means you need to stay away from other people as much as possible, so you don't give the virus to someone else.
