



LADYBUGS & RUGRATS IS **Up & Running**

In the last edition of Tieri News we were thrilled to reveal, after much anticipation, family day care was finally coming to Tieri. With support from Enhance Family Day Care and Oaky Creek Coal, Lisa Austin-Richards welcomed the first children to Ladybugs and Rugrats on Monday 20

Lisa, last time we spoke you were deep in the throes of setting up your new family day care service. Take us through the process.

February 2023. We caught up with Lisa to

find out how it's been going.

Once I moved into the home provided by Glencore, I got busy unpacking and setting up the spaces ready for inspections by Enhance Family Day Care (FDC). I have support visits once a month from my Enhance FDC Practice Mentor to ensure the environment remains safe and suitable for the children in my care. My daughter had a great time looking through toy catalogues for some new resources to add to the room. We have a great little set up here, but I made sure that it still feels like a home.

Glencore has provided you with a house that's been designed and approved for a safe family day care facility. Can you describe the space/s for us?

The house is the perfect Family Day Care home. Walking in the front door you have a spacious lounge room/open playroom which is used for dance parties and using large foam blocks, and off to the right of that is a massive playroom filled with a wide variety of toys and resources for the children to choose from. The kitchen is perfect for little ones to learn how to cook, and together we have already made our own bread and brownies. The dining room has proven to make the perfect arts and craft room where the children can enjoy painting, collaging, gluing, cutting and creating anything they can imagine. The best part of the house is the outside yard. We try to spend a large portion of the day outside enjoying nature and all it has to offer. Water play has been a favourite and in the coming weeks a vegetable garden and flower garden will be planted by the children.

What's the interest been like from the community? Did you have many applications for a placement?

I have received great interest and excitement from the community. Even people who don't have childcare needs currently have said how great it is, as it is something the community has been needing for a while.



How did it feel when you welcomed the first children into your care?

Having not done family day care before I was very nervous on my first day. I was worried how my own child would handle sharing her mum, toys, and home with other children. I had concerns running around in my head about whether this was all going to work, but the moment the first children arrived I felt at ease! When we started playing and doing crafts it felt so very natural and all my worries vanished! I have opened every day since, with a big smile, ready to conquer the day with my little ones by my side.

What's a typical day like for you...and for the children you provide education and care for?

A typical day is spent inside until morning tea. During that time the children can choose from a wide range of resources to use, and we have arts and crafts and group time. After morning tea, it's outside time (the children's favourite part of the day) and we run and play and jump until lunch time. Lunch time is followed by rest/quiet time. Once the children wake up, we have afternoon tea and then head back outside, weather permitting, until home time.



What's your approach to family day care and how do you decide what to do with the children?

My approach to education and care is child led, by giving children autonomy over their own day, which is very important. I can incorporate what the children need to learn (sharing, kindness, self-help skills, etc.) into activities the children love to do. Children who love hairdressing can also learn to tie their shoes as they learn to tie bows in dolls' hair. Children who love water play can learn about gravity, big versus small, fast versus slow, all by trying to pass water through a funnel or pouring it into a cup. By allowing a child to learn through play they are more engaged and more likely to use what they have learnt. To adults, play often just looks like fun, but everything a child does leads to them learning something or trying to perfect something they have already learnt.

What's the funniest thing a child has done/said?

While learning about the different products animals provide us with (milk from cows, wool from sheep, etc.) the children were confused about why we only drink cow's milk and not pig's milk or chicken milk. A few of the children asked if they could try chicken milk because "it sounds yummy". We did some research and learnt the reason why we don't drink pig milk and can't drink chicken milk. We then learnt that we do drink goat's milk. The children said that was disgusting. It gave me a good chuckle that in their minds it was okay to drink chicken milk, but goat's milk was "gross".

How do you keep families informed about what their children have been up to?

I send out daily stories and pictures informing the families about the fun we have been up to during the day. In family day care, we use the Early Years Learning Framework to guide our planning and the sharing of this with families.





How does Enhance Family Day Care support you?

Enhance Family Day Care has been incredible. My first week open I had daily phone calls checking to make sure everything was running smoothly. They have answered any questions and have provided tons of resources to help make me a better educator.

Have you had any feedback from families and/or the community?

The feedback is all positive and the community has been incredibly supportive and helpful.

What's been the highlight for you so far?

My biggest highlight has been seeing how happy the children are to be here. Hearing the children laugh and smile and knowing that they are having a great time has been incredible.

What's been the most surprising thing?

How easy and natural it feels has been really surprising for me. I have always loved working with children but opening my home to virtual strangers and being my own boss has felt very easy and comfortable. The community in Tieri has been so lovely and accommodating that opening my home up to them didn't seem scary at all.

Anything else you'd like to share?

I would like to thank both Enhance Family Day Care and Glencore for allowing me this incredible opportunity - I hope I make you both proud. Without their support this would never have happened, and it has already changed my life so much.

A FLOWER IN TIME

Tell us a bit about you and how your business began?

I'm from the small mining town of Moranbah and had lived there my whole life until the end of last year when my partner and I decided that long distance wasn't for us and moved in together, here in Tieri.

Following the move, I was trying to figure out what I wanted to do for work. I had trained, qualified and been working in a florist in Moranbah for over two years but unfortunately there wasn't a florist in Tieri that I could join. This is where the idea of setting up my own business began. I wanted to continue to do what I loved and what I excelled at, and so A Flower In Time was born.

What products and services do you provide for the community?

I specialise in preserved floral home decor. This comes in many variations so I am very flexible with customer requests and any ideas that my clients may have when creating those finishing touches to their homes or office.

What made you want to get into the flower industry?

I've always had a passion for creating and I wanted to put my skills to use in something that I love doing. I feel that floristry is my purpose in life. I enjoy witnessing the happiness my arrangements bring to my customers when I create something beautiful for them or for their loved ones.

What training did you have to go through?

When starting out, I had to complete a Certificate III in floristry. I did this through the Flower School which is located In Brisbane. Unfortunately, living in a rural area, I couldn't travel to the classes but I had the option of learning online via Zoom. Working in a florist helped me put my training into practice and gave me the skills and confidence I needed to go out on my own and build a business for myself.

How did you come up with the name, A Flower In Time?

I've always been a fan of fairy tales so instead of Once Upon A Time, I thought A Flower In Time was perfect. It suits me as a person and it represents what I want to create for my customers: a fairy tale ending for flowers.

What's the best part about your job?

I get to do what I love and put my energy into what I'm good at. I love the joy it brings to my customers when they get to see what I have created for them. It's the best feeling in the world.



What's the most challenging part?

Like any creative industry, it's good practice to keep up with the latest trends in the industry so you can stay ahead of the floral game. This means you are always having to step outside of your comfort zone, which can be challenging, but exciting and inspiring as well.

A little known fact about the floristry industry?

There is so much more to the industry than just playing with flowers. The hard work and dedication that goes into your floral arrangements is amazing. From the growers to the wholesalers, to the florists and then to consumers. The conditioning and care of the flowers is all part of getting the longest lifespan out of your beautiful flowers.

What's the busiest time of year for a florist?

February and May - Valentine's Day and Mothers Day.

What makes a great bouquet of flowers?

There's a florist term for this - it's called straussing. Straussing is when you lay all your materials out, the flowers, foliage and fillers. Begin by placing them individually in your hand. You want to layer each piece the exact same way, either clockwise or counter clockwise, whichever you feel most comfortable with. This technique creates a secure and stable bouquet structure. Once done, your stems should resemble a spiral and should all be facing the same way.

What's the most popular choice of flowers?

Natives - I get asked a lot to include these in arrangements, along with a neutral colour pallet.

What's your favourite flower?

This may sound cliche, but it has to be roses. I'm a bit of a romantic at heart and roses are just so stunning and versatile. They come in all sorts of colours, but if they don't come in the colour you want, you can always dye them with floral spray paint or food colouring!



How do you come up with the different types of floral arrangements?

I always ask my customers questions to get a clear understanding of what they want, everything from what colours they (or the person they are buying for) like, to the types of flowers they love. Then, when I'm creating different flower combinations, I use the information I've learned from the customer and combine it with my experience to visualise what I want to design.

What goes into creating a floral home decor piece?

First you need to ensure you have all the right equipment as a florist such as wire, scissors, parafilm and dried oasis. I always love to make sure I have a range of different vases and flowers to suit everyone's home decor. I mainly stock naturals as these will never go out of trend. When creating my floral art work I always use the five principles of design - texture, space, line, colour and form - to help me design and construct the perfect home decor for my customers.

What impact do you hope to have on the Tieri Community?

I hope I can create unique, special floral statement pieces for every home in Tieri! I aim to provide a wonderful service for my customers and hopefully establish some long term friendships in Tieri along the way.

Positions Available AT TIERI DAYCARE

It's not just the town of Tieri that celebrates a milestone anniversary this year - Tieri Daycare Association has been operating here in town for an incredible 35 years!

The not-for-profit centre opened its doors and welcomed the first children into its care on Wednesday, 27 October, 1993. Since then, hundreds of Tieri's tots have played, learned and developed at the daycare.

Today, Tieri Daycare is open every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 8.30am until 2.20pm for up to 21 children per day, ranging from 6 weeks to five year-olds.

Kyria Luhrs, Director, has been in the industry for over a decade and at the helm of Tieri Daycare for the last six months. "I started out as a volunteer in Capella where my best mate was the Director of a daycare facility. I had a great support network who recognised my passion and encouraged me to get my Certificate III in Childcare. I loved it and carried on training to get my Diploma and worked my way up the ranks to Director."

I've always loved children - I've got five of my own! As
Director of Tieri Daycare, I love engaging with the children and
watching each individual child learn and develop. They really
do come up with the funniest things. I also love communicating
with the families and seeing how they work together as a unit.
It's brilliant."

Natalie Collier, joins Kyria as an Assistant Relief Director and Full Time Assistant. She's been at TDC for a year and before that was a Kindergarten teacher on the Sunshine coast for 8 years and has worked with children for the past 18 years.

Catherine Windsor has been part of the Tieri community for 20 years and working at Tieri Daycare for over a year. She recently completed her Cert III in Childcare Services.

Kira Messenger, completes the daycare team in her role as Cleaner and Support Worker, making sure the centre is spotless and safe for the little ones.

The ethos at Tieri Daycare is for the children to learn through play. "Everything we do is led by the children," explains Kyria. "We watch them to see what they are interested in and the activities they gravitate towards and let that guide us. For example, they're currently interested in dinosaurs so we've set up play and educational stations for them based around that. It makes it far more enjoyable and engaging for them."




A typical day starts with some outside play before heading inside for morning tea. Group time and inside play then kicks off with an Acknowledgement to Country and special morning song before the kids choose from a wide selection of arts and crafts. After lunch time, it's rest time or quiet time with some puzzles or books and then off home.

"The team and I want to create a space where the kids feel safe and welcome, and comfortable and confident to try more things," says Kyria. "We would love to get more parents and carers involved. We want them to see us as an educational offering, not just a babysitting service."

"We try to work our curriculum so it helps get them ready for school routines. We have great relationships with the Kindy, Tieri State School, CTM Links and Nurse Sue. It's really blown my mind how supportive the Tieri community is of each other. It's a great place for children to grow up."

Peak Downs Pirates Senior Rugby League is Back!

After a decade's hiatus, the Peak Downs Senior Pirates have been voted back into the Central Highlands Rugby League competition for 2023 thanks, in part, to the efforts of locals Justin Madden, Axel Cutts, Nick Barry and Mitch Reinke.

"We were all raised in Tieri and grew up playing footy for the Pirates," says Axel. "Watching the team play footy used to be such a fixture on the Tieri calendar. It was a real family event. The parents would have their food and drink as the kids played and wore themselves out. We often wouldn't get home until the small hours of the morning! It's not just about the footy - we wanted to bring that community spirit back as well."

After an unsuccessful attempt in 2022, Axel and Justin formed the committee again this year, verbally secured sponsorship, got the financials from the last 10 years documented and validated and took that all to the league...and got voted back in for 2023.

"We're so stoked to be bringing live footy back to Tieri, especially as the town is starting to fill up again. We wouldn't have been able to do this without the hard work of the Committee and the generosity of our sponsors (see page 16), so a huge thank you goes to all of them."

"The return of the Pirates is big news for the club and for the towns of Tieri and Capella, especially because it coincides with the 40-year anniversary of Tieri (see page 3) - we're hoping to have an honorary 'Old Boys' game in heritage jerseys to mark the milestone."

When we spoke to Axel, the celebrations of the announcement had given way to a focus on getting ready for the season and trying to recruit as many people as possible, something that proves quite challenging in a mining town. "The hardest part about being out here is that players come and go with their shifts, so the team varies week in week out."

That's why training is so vital to success, it's not only important for skill practice, it helps the players bond as a team before a match. They'll be training throughout the entire season at the Tieri football fields every Tuesday and Thursday from 6.30pm ... and it's an open invitation for any fitness enthusiast to join in.



Community Gives Positive Feedback

(LOCAL VOICES SURVEY UPDATE)



"Thank you to everyone who took the time to share their thoughts and provide feedback," said Kate French, Environment & Community Advisor at Oaky Creek Coal. "And congratulations to the lucky winner, Alba Osorio, who received a brand-new YETI esky!"

With each completed 'Pulse' survey response, a \$5 donation is made to a local community group. So far, more than \$2,500 has been donated to groups like Capricorn Helicopter Rescue Service, Tieri Sharks Swimming Club, CTM Links and more.

A Snapshot of Your Feedback

For most, feelings towards Oaky Creek Coal have remained steady, but for more than a third (35%) feelings towards Oaky Creek Coal have become more positive over the past year.

Some had positive feedback about the actions taken by Oaky Creek Coal, such as 'They are doing their best' and 'Oaky does a great job with their communication', while others raised concerns or made suggestions for improvement.

"There were some suggestions on a wide variety of topics, ranging from the provision of information by the town, to the reopening of a bowling club, suggestions for recreational activities, the wellbeing of the workforce, through to the issue of magpies," said Kate.

More specifically, this latest Pulse survey explored the community's thoughts on the environmental impacts of Oaky Creek Coal. Interestingly, perception of the company's negative impact on the environment in the community saw an upward trend from the last survey. However, of those respondents who reported an environmental issue, the majority (87%) were satisfied or very satisfied with the company's response to how the issue was dealt with.

Survey respondents were also generally happy with the company's compliance with environmental laws and regulations and their openness to receiving reports from the community.

"It was great to see positive scores for Oaky Creek Coal's efforts in rehabilitating previously mined land, (see page 32)" said Kate. "Awareness of the Progressive Rehabilitation and Closure Plan (PRCP) can still be improved and encouragingly most respondents (69%) indicated they are interested in receiving information about it, so we'll be looking for more ways to share this information with you, including in Tieri News, on the Tieri website and at the Community Reference Group meetings."

Looking ahead, as a community, you indicated you would like to see more information on topics like the future of the town after a mine closes, management of environmental

incidents, interaction with local farms and

landowners, and rehabilitation efforts for wildlife and the environment (see page 30).

"The more people who participate in the survey, the more accurate the picture we have of the community's sentiments, so a big thank you again to everyone who participated in this latest survey. Your feedback is really important as it helps inform our focus and direction and where we allocate investment and resourcing. We hope even more members of the community will

consider taking part in the next survey - your voice can make a real difference in Tieri," said Kate.

"It's valuable for us to know the topics that you're interested in so we can share relevant information with *you through the various*

ABOUT TOWN... Old Tieri Credit Union Shop to Become a 'Multi-User Community Space'

Have you noticed some construction work going on at the Old Tieri Credit Union Shop and wondered what's happening? We caught up with Kate French, Environment & Community Advisor at OCC to find out!

Spill the beans Kate, what's occurring?

We are currently in the process of converting the Old Tieri Credit Union Shop at the Tieri Shopping Centre into a multipurpose, multi-user community space!

Exciting! For those that don't know, where is it located?

It's the Old Tieri Queensland Country Credit Union building at the Tieri Town Shopping Centre – between Tieri Post Office and Tieri Bar & Grill.

What has been in the building since the Credit Union closed down?

It's been unused by any business for many years and just used as a storage space by Town Services for excess furniture, etc.

Who decided to turn it into a community space?

Following feedback from the Tieri community that it would be great to see the space better utilised, the E&C team decided to convert it into a multipurpose space.

What's the objective of the new space?

We want to provide a blank canvas for OCC and the local community to benefit from. A space at a key location in the town to hold events and activities that bring our community together.

How do you hope the new space will benefit the Tieri community?

It's a fresh, clean, air conditioned and centrally-located space for community groups to meet and engage in a range of activities. The idea is that it won't be locked in to any one particular use. It will be available for short-term hire to different groups and for different uses. Nothing like that exists in town at the moment.

Can you give some examples of how the community can use the space?

Anything for small to medium sized groups! Pop up events, pop up shops, youth events, art classes, community classes, static displays of art. In fact, we're planning to use it during the Tieri 40th Anniversary (see page 3) celebrations in August/September as a space to display memorabilia from the last four decades. No doubt once the space is completed and in use, more ideas will come forward. We hope to get feedback from the Tieri Community Reference Group (CRG) about their suggestions too.

When did the construction work begin? January 2023.

What is being done to transform the space?

Renovations include new vinyl flooring, a new internal ceiling, and a partition wall. We're installing data and power points and air conditioning, and giving it a fresh coat of paint in neutral colours to create a blank canvas for many uses. There is a small kitchenette with a sink at the rear of the space, which will be very handy. Public toilets, the children's playground and a café are all located very close by.

Who is doing the work?

DBS QLD (existing local contractor).

When is work expected to be completed? March/April 2023.

Can anyone use the space?


Yes, they just need to adhere to the Terms & Conditions that we're currently developing.

What will it cost to hire?

This is still being determined, but we want to keep it as affordable as possible so it's a viable option for the community.

If people would like to use the space, how can they reserve it?

We're in the process of working out the best booking system. Once we've set everything up, we'll be announcing it to the community on tieri.com.au, at Tieri CRG Meetings, on community notices and in future newsletters - so stay tuned!

Our top little town is full of interesting people from varied backgrounds. Each edition, we'll be chatting to different members of the community to get their story and share it with you so you get to "Meet the Locals".

We spoke to Wayne Trenerry, Superintendent and Greenskeeper at Tieri Golf Club....





What brought you to Tieri, and when?

I came specifically for this job, four years ago. I was at Emu Park before that.

What's your history with golf?

I've been playing since I was 14 years old. One of my best mates I went to school with got me hooked.

How did you become a Greenskeeper?

I'm a qualified builder by trade but I had a bad accident back in 2002. My doctor told me I couldn't continue with building work, so I had to change careers. It just happened that before the accident, I had been looking after a golf course. I enjoyed it, so did my Cert III in Greenkeeping and Horticulture, which teaches you how to keep soil and plants healthy. It covered all types of stuff like how to plant and maintain gardens, how to install water features, how to identify and look after different species of grasses, how to eradicate weeds without killing grass, the mechanical side, irrigation systems, and more.

What does being a Greenskeeper involve?

Week in, week out it's all about mowing the greens, keeping up with diseases in the greens and making sure I'm tackling them properly, manicuring the fairways, keeping the rough down, raking the bunkers, maintaining the gardens and generally making sure the course is ready for competition from Friday onwards.

2023 marks the 40th anniversary of Tieri. What role does the golf course play in our town?

It brings people together. When I started working here, there were only ~20 members. Now we have over 100! For a town our size, that's great. We've even got a few out of towners!

What was the course like when you first started?

It was fine, but there were a few things that needed to be done. I was given three months to sort it out, but it took three years due to the irrigation needing to be replaced.

What's the most rewarding part of your job?

The players you get to meet and the compliments you get - especially when you speak to people who haven't been here for years. They often come up and say "Wow, it wasn't like this before!" - it's a great feeling getting that recognition for your efforts.

Speaking of recognition, last year Tieri Golf Club won the PGA Regional Tournament of the Year - congratulations! What did winning that award mean to you?

It meant a LOT! It meant all that hard work had paid off. It was even more of a buzz to win it in a small town like Tieri! And to have the support of the Committee and



all our sponsors, who are amazing - we simply wouldn't be able to run the tournament without them. We have so many great players turn up to play at the tournament and for those golf professionals to vote on your course...well, it's just phenomenal!

People are still talking about it. I was in Rockhampton and got congratulated. The President of the Superintendents Association - who has been a big feature in my life as a Greenskeeper and convinced me to stick with it when I was about to quit - came up to me after the awards and said "Mate, you've done it!!" - it was a great feeling.

Of course, the challenge now is backing it up this year!

How are you going to do that?

There's a lot of exciting things happening. The Club and Committee are always wanting to improve which is what I love about this job. But it's not easy - there's a lot of stress involved. Sometimes trying to do all the simple things well is the hardest.

We're lucky to have had an abundance of rain recently so we've got grass covered from tree line to tree line. We're in the process of expanding parts of the course and we're hoping to have a new water feature installed later in the year. Lots to come!

What makes a top golf course?

Consistent, clean, weed-free greens throughout, with consistent speeds.

How do you describe yourself?

Hard working. I'm passionate about what I do and take a lot of pride in my work. If I'm not happy with it, I'll stay and keep going until it's done right. I keep striving.

How would your mates describe you?

Like a bull out the gate! A happy-go-lucky, sometimes cranky bloke, who wears his heart on his sleeve.

How do you spend your spare time...and with whom?

With my two kids, my 20 year old son and 17 year old daughter, and either camping or fishing.

Get in Quick: Rise Up Central Highlands Provides Financial Support to Help Enhance the Region's Streetscapes

There's still a few days left to take advantage of 'Rise Up Central Highlands', a new initiative of the council's Economic Stimulus Framework. The program provides financial support to commercial business owners and community members wanting to upgrade their business shop fronts or activate underused places.

In a first for the region, a placemaking grant will be open to support business and community members to bring to life spaces whether that might be a temporary pop-up event or new artwork.

The program has established three different grant streams and/or one rebate towards development fees and charges:

- **Historical upgrade** for restoration projects on buildings with historical significance (up to \$10,000)
- Façade upgrade for streetside visual improvements (up to \$2,000)
- Placemaking for creating spaces where people can gather (up to \$,2000)
- The fees and charges rebate is a continuation of the council's commitment to encourage new development that attracts new jobs and facilitates investment needed in our region by reducing up-front costs.

Central Highlands Youth Strategy and Action Plan

(Re)Discover Your Love of Books AT TIERI LIBRARY

When was the last time you got lost in the pages of a good book? With so much of our time spent staring at a computer or phone screen, a 'real' book can provide a much-needed break from a digital world, transporting us to a whole new world of the author's imagination.

With World Book Day on 23rd April, we took the opportunity to chat to Aimee Preston and Jennifer Tzilves, co-managers at Tieri Library & Transaction Centre, to discover what's available to the people of Tieri.

How long has the library been in Tieri? What changes have you seen in that time?

The Library & Transaction Centre was constructed over 30 years ago, in 1991/92. When the facility first opened, there were two staff members, one in the library and one in an administration role. Both were part time roles, with the administrator working in the mornings and the librarian in the afternoons. It was all very different back then - all our records and systems were paper based for one thing! In that time, we've seen the rise of computers and the installation of public computers, different ways of borrowing books

- either hard copies, digital eBooks, and audio books, as well as the introduction of library programs and events across all ages. Sadly, the number of users and members of the facility has dropped off in recent times, no doubt due to the electronic era, which is a shame because the library has so much to offer.

What services are available there?

We provide both Library and Transaction services.

From the library, people can access all the latest books. We have an online catalogue - called 'Montage' - that you can access online, on any device to see what's in stock, what you have read, make reservations or renewals, share across your social media and leave reviews.


The CHRC Library Service has created a new collection of resources available to loan called 'UpSkill Collection'. These resources are available to loan in all different formats to aid your personal, team, or business professional development journey.

The Reader & Learning Kits which are great for both children and adults developing their basic literacy and numeracy skills as well as learning sign language, braille, yoga and more.

If you are part of, or starting, a Book Club, we have Book Club Sets (including conversation prompts and 9 copies of the book) available to be borrowed for your club. We swap and purchase new sets all the time so you'll always have something new to cover.

Whilst we still love hard copy books, BorrowBox gives you access to the latest fiction and non-fiction bestsellers in eBook or audiobook format and Libby, the app for libraries, offer countless other eMagazines, eComics, eBooks and digital audiobooks that you can borrow instantly, for free. All you need is your library card.

Access Ancestry.com on our Public Access Computers and start researching your family history for free.





We have a dedicated space for children to discover books and stretch their imaginations and a fenced off outdoor play area if they need to burn off some energy.

And we have spaces for the adults to sit back, relax and get lost in a book.

The Transaction Centre provides a range of administration services such as council enquiries or reporting any council-related matters including water, waste, road, dog registration, supervision of exams, etc.

Can people work from the library?

Yes anyone can work from the facility on a temporary basis - we have public computers, printing and free Wi-Fi available.

What events and activities do you hold at the library?

Our "First5Forever" program provides fun activity sessions for children aged 1 – 5 years and includes storytime, nursery rhymes, crafts and more. The sessions, held during term time, are free and must be booked in advance:

- Baby Rhyme Time (suitable for ages 0-2 years): First Friday of the month at 10:30am a fun and interactive half-hour program full of simple songs, action rhymes, and shared book reading.
- Wriggle & Rhyme (suitable for ages 2-3): First Wednesday of the month at 10:30am a half-hour program aimed at boosting your toddler's literacy development by having fun with action songs, fingerplays, dances, rhymes, stories, and sensory play.
- **Storytime** (suitable for ages 3-5 years): Every Tuesday at 10:30am activities range from reading, singing, dancing and simple crafts.

Between 9 - 11am every Monday during school term, Tieri Possums Playgroup meets here and provides a wonderful get-together for Mums and kids to enjoy books and access to a garden playground.

Dates and activities for the Library School Holiday Programmes are published on the Tieri Noticeboard, as well as Eventbrite and CHRC_Libraries website.

We're a small regional town - what type of books do you have available?

The Library constantly receives new books on a regular basis and we can order in books on request so you don't need to miss out. Books are also changed on a regular basis and swapped around with all the other libraries within the Central Highland Regional Council Libraries, meaning the community has a wide variety to choose from.

How do people rent books - what's the cost?

It's FREE! That's the great thing about libraries. You just need to become a member of our Library (which is also free) and you're good to go! Generally, books can be borrowed for up to one month and renewed if needed.

What's the most popular genre amongst the Tieri community?

Interestingly, the most popular genres here in Tieri have been recipe books and children's books.

What book are you currently reading?

I [Jennifer] have just finished reading 'Gold Rush – How I Made, Lost and Made a Fortune'. It's a non-fiction book written by Jim Richards, who now lives in WA. I highly recommend it!

In a world of technology, why do you think tangible books are still so important?

"Real" books are so wonderful. It's lovely to actually pick up a book and manually turn pages. I hope books will always be around so public libraries can stay open to connect people in the future and beyond.

What role do you believe a library plays in a community like Tieri?

Our role in the Tieri community is a very important one. We offer not only library and transaction services, but it's a place to come and relax and chill out on your own or with your children. The library has a friendly inviting environment, with a great play area for children. In communities like ours, a library provides a place for connecting with others and also for escaping and exploring different worlds through the power of words.

How can people find out what's on at the library?

Details are posted on the Central Highlands Regional Council website. We'll be celebrating World Book Day at Tieri Library on 19th April 2023, at 10:00 am and would love to see as many people as possible come along to discover or rediscover their love of books!

Tieri Family Unit and Child Health Centre offers the Tieri Community a wide variety of free services, provided by Queensland Health with Sue Hall - registered nurse, Midwife, Child Health Nurse, Immunisation Provider Nurse and Triple P facilitator.

- Antenatal Care and Education by the Midwife for Private and Public Clients: Tieri works closely with Emerald Hospital. The Centre offers Midwifery clinics where your pregnancy progress and questions are discussed, with blood pressure checks, urine tests and listening to your foetus. Antenatal Education has been proven to be very beneficial to mothers and fathers, in understanding the differences to a midwifery or a medical birth. These education sessions are held on an individual basis, to ensure your specific questions are addressed. Antenatal Education sessions are also held in Emerald Hospital on a Tuesday evening.
- Postnatal Care: for the first 8 weeks for mothers. An
 extended Midwifery Service for clients who discharge prior
 to Day 7 after the birth of their baby. Home visits are done
 for mothers and babies after discharge for clients in Tieri and
 Capella and surrounding properties. Please phone as soon as you
 are home or discharged from hospital to arrange a home visit to
 ensure your questions about your precious baby are answered.

- Well Baby Clinic: initial home visits are offered for all clients, followed by parents attending the Clinic in Tieri. All parents are encouraged to visit the Tieri Clinic for fine and gross motor developmental assessments when their babies are 2, 4, 6, 9, 12 and 18 months old, and then when their children are 2, 3, 4, and 5 years of age.
- Speech Assessments: are done at the 3-year-old development assessment, or earlier if parents are concerned.
- Hearing and Vision assessments: are available when children have their 4- and 5-year developmental assessments as part of the Well Baby Clinic. An 'Ages and Stages Questionnaire' is sent to parents prior to the appointment for completion at home with your child.
- Positive Parenting Program: individual, group and seminar sessions are all available, for FREE, at the Tieri Centre.
 - **Individual sessions** address specific issues such as tantrums, toilet training and sleep.
 - **Group sessions** run once a year, over 4 sessions. Bookings essential as there are limited places available. Phone 4984 8366 today to secure your spot and learn why children behave the way they do and why 'time out' may not be working. Suitable for children from 18 months to 8 years.
 - Seminar sessions are held towards the end of the year. The 3 sessions cover the building block essentials for children. Classes are advertised on the Tieri Noticeboard Facebook page, the Tieri Noticeboard near the Tieri Pharmacy, and the Capella Noticeboard near the Capella News Agency.



- Immunisation Clinic: held on the first and third Wednesday of each month, between 9am to 10am. The Immunisation Clinic is FREE for everyone, from birth to 100 years old. Clients from rural areas or other towns can make appointments for immunisation and developmental assessments on other days. Free Flu vaccinations are available all year round.
- Well Women's Nurse (from Rockhampton): this visiting service comes to Tieri twice a year to do cervical screening (pap smear), discuss contraception, fertility issues, menopause, and any other women's health needs in general. The next clinic in Tieri is on the 18th and 19th of October. Call 4984 8366 now to book your appointment as this clinic fills fast. If you have not had a pap smear since December 2018 then you have not had a cervical screening which is due every 5 years. Your life is important to you and your family book today.
- Dressings and Removal of Sutures, etc.: these can be carried out at the Centre, free of charge on a need-by-need basis.
- Referrals: the Health Centre is able to provide referrals to a wide variety of health services in Emerald, Rockhampton, Mackay. Simply make an appointment to discuss your concerns and Sue will endeavour to help find a solution.
- Video Conferencing Services: are available for clients with specialists based in Qld.
- Capella Clinic: Sue provides baby clinic and vaccination clinic services in Capella on the second and fourth Thursdays of the month. Please call Tieri 4984 8366 to book an appointment for Capella.

• Human Relations education: will be starting at Tieri State School for Grades 5 and 6 students. These sessions run over 6 weeks and cover puberty, nutrition, exercise, hygiene, self esteem, and bullying. For further information, please contact Tieri State School.

Interaction with Local Landowners

Open communication and ongoing engagement with the local community is important to Oaky Creek Coal. Every year, the Environment & Community (E&C) team holds a Neighbours Day to catch up with their neighbouring landholders.

Some 18 properties overlap with Oaky Creek Coal mining leases and exploration tenure. Five landholders adjoin the mining lease, and there are many other landholders covered by exploration leases (100 square kilometres of tenure).

All were invited to the Neighbours Day and representatives from four properties attended.

Graham Gardner, Rob Ciesiolka and Michael Daly from Oaky Creek Surface and Paul Gardner from OCC HR joined Joel May, Kate French, Barbara van der Pol, Celeste Asmad, Marijke Schuurs, and Josh Riethmuller from the E&C team.

"The objective of the day was to bring everyone together, provide an update on OCC activities, gather input from the landholders and answer any questions they may have," said Kate French, Environment & Community Advisor.

The day began with breakfast followed by presentations from different parts of OCC. Topics covered included an update on the Progressive Rehabilitation and Closure Plan (PRCP), EA amendment, rehabilitation, rehabilitation certification, weeds and feral animals.

"The Landholders asked some valuable questions such as how long do we have to wait until we can apply for certification of rehab areas and why do the void pits have high salinity," reflects Kate.

Certification depends more on the quality of the rehabilitation than the age. We need to adequately demonstrate that the area is meeting set monitoring criteria over a period of time. And the water quality in the voids is influenced by the saline coal seam and water evaporating over time increases salinity," Kate explained.

"They were also interested in potential grazing areas, and we discussed cattle agistment and fencing requirements, including the location and type of fences, something that we will follow up on with each landholder individually."

The day concluded as Landholders were presented with an annual Christmas hamper of gourmet goodies from a local homewares business. For those who could not attend, their hampers were delivered to their property via a local courier.

Throughout the year, the E&C team engages with Landholders on an as needed basis. "Some neighbours require more frequent contact than others. For example, contact to undertake monthly air or water monitoring activities on their property, coordinate exploration projects, discuss cattle agistment," explains Kate.

The next Neighbours Day will be held November/December 2023. ●







At the end of last year, Oaky Creek Coal appointed six new candidates to Glencore's Apprenticeship Program. Damon Geaney, Mason O'Brien and Grady Watt as Mechanical Apprentices and Cooper Paxton, Cameron Spencer and Tom Tozer as Electrical Apprentices.

For the first time in the history of the Apprenticeship Program, Glencore invited the successful applicants to a pre-site visit at Oaky Creek Coal, timed around the Tieri Town Christmas Party. "We thought it would be a great opportunity for the new apprentices to meet each other and for them and their families to get a feel for what life is like on the mine and in our town," said Michael McGrath, Mechanical Engineering Manager.

Three of the six were able to attend and, in December, they were taken on a tour of the surface mine and underground, as well as the Mess and accommodation, before joining the Christmas festivities with the rest of locals. "It was a real success," reflects Michael. "They all gave positive feedback saying the pre-visit was valuable, especially for their families who got to see the environment they would be working and living in."

At the beginning of January, Cameron, Cooper, Damon, Grady, Mason and Tom were introduced to 85 other apprentices who were attending the 2-day Apprentice Meeting. They engaged with induction training and were introduced to fire fighting, Caba and Self Rescue from Singleton Mines Rescue who also conducted the activity day for the other apprentices.

"The 2-day Apprentice Meeting can be pretty full on, so we turn the training and activities into a bit of a friendly competition," explains Michael. "The competition is just a bit of fun, but I'm still proud to say that our Oaky Creek Coal apprentices won because it reflects their attention to learning and development."

The event concluded with Oaky Creek's fourth year apprentices - Caitlyn McErlean and Kyle Vogler (Electrical) and Ethan Geri (Mechanical) - being signed off and appointed as qualified tradespeople. "I'm delighted to report that all of them secured permanent, ongoing employment at OCC as tradespeople!"

Oaky Creek Coal has been running Glenore's Apprenticeship Program since 2005. In that time, 96 apprentices have started the program. In 2023, they have six new first years, six in their second year apprenticeship, four in their third year and four in their fourth year, bringing the total number to 20.

Participation in the program is in high demand, with several hundred hopefuls applying every year. Those who make it through the interview stage are brought to Emerald as part of the face-to-face interviews on behalf of all QLD sites. Once an offer has been made and accepted, candidates go through a medical and pre-employment screening to help determine which type of apprenticeship they are most suited to: mechanical or electrical trades for Oaky.

From there, they are invited to a pre-visit at the site so they are familiar with the set up and the town before they officially kick start their apprenticeship.

In their first year, they spend 30 weeks studying at TAFE, with about 12 weeks on site at the mine. In their second and third years, they spend less time at TAFE and more time at the mine. Their fourth and final year is roughly 20 percent at TAFE, and 80 percent on site or on placement with organisations such as Hastings or Komatsu etc. or domestic placements with an electrical contractor to give them real world experience at practising their trade before being signed off.

For Michael, Glencore's Apprenticeship Program is all about mentoring young people. "It's about giving them the opportunity to grow both their skill base and as a person. It's incredible watching them transition from inexperienced or lacking confidence to people who are capable and self-assured."

Mentoring and providing development pathways is something Michael is really passionate about, having been a Scout Leader and leading the P&C at his kid's school, but this is his first opportunity to do it in a professional capacity.

I'm looking forward to providing apprentices at Oaky Creek with the right support to help them step out of their comfort zones. This is where they will learn and grow the most. No matter how old we are, or how experienced, if we don't stretch ourselves, we'll be stuck and won't develop as a person. I love those moments when they've been taught something or experienced a scenario for the first time and the light suddenly goes on and you know they get it...that feeling is priceless."



The Environmental Protection Act 1994 requires that all areas disturbed by mining activities must be rehabilitated to a post-mining land use. In line with this, Glencore Oaky Creek Coal is legally required to develop what's known as a **Progressive Rehabilitation and Closure Plan** (PRCP).

A PRCP details the activities that need to be carried out in order to successfully rehabilitate the land occupied by the mine and return it to a stable condition. It includes a Rehabilitation Plan with details of technical studies regarding flooding, groundwater, revegetation, geotechnical stability, water management, etc.; proposed postmining land uses, including analysis and justification; information about consultation with relevant members of the community (e.g. local landholders, Government, Traditional Owners, etc.) and details of the proposed rehabilitation methods and techniques that will be used to return the land to a stable condition. The PRCP also includes a Rehabilitation Schedule outlining the timeframe for delivering the rehabilitation.

OCC began working on the PRCP in 2020. Since then, the Environment & Community team has been busy:

- Conducting a series of geotechnical, ecological, aquatic, terrestrial and hydrology studies to help them understand the current lay of the land. For example, the gradient of the land, the soil conditions, identifying fish, bird and plant species, and testing the water chemistry and quality.
- Holding consultation sessions with local landholders, council
 and State Government, and other relevant members of the local
 community, including the Tieri Community Reference Group
 (CRG), regarding the rehabilitation and closure of the site.
- Providing some initial proposals for Post-Mining Land Use for certain areas to the Department of Environment and Science (DES) for feedback, including grazing land, open woodland and wetland areas. These proposals have been developed using the information and findings from the studies and the insights from the community consultations.

The team is now in the process of completing the PRCP studies and compiling the documentation and plan ready for submission in November 2023.

"OCC recently submitted an Environmental Authority (EA) amendment application to include further detail for post mine lands, specifically what constitutes Post Mine Land Uses and Non-Use Management Areas

(NUMAs) and their management requirements towards closure, which is a key step in the process. These areas need to be formally included in the site's EA licence so they can then be included in the PRCP rehabilitation planning." says Joel May, Environment & Community Manager.

AN IMPORTANT 'Wake Up Call'

The health and wellbeing of Oaky Creek Coal employees - and of the entire Tieri community - is of utmost importance to Glencore. That's why Lucy Sullivan, Health Coordinator at OCC, organised for renowned speaker, Paul Spinks, to present to every crew at the mine site during March, as well as a community session for the people of Tieri.

Paul Spinks has been an Advanced Care Paramedic for Queensland Ambulance and Trauma Councillor for the past twenty years. He was previously a commercial pilot and worked alongside Qantas and contracted by the International Air Transport Association to deliver safety seminars worldwide.

As a Paramedic and Councillor, Paul has seen what happens when life spins out of control. He is now on a mission to give people an important 'Wake Up Call' when it comes to their mental and physical health. In his sessions, he delivers a very personal, powerful, and thought-provoking message: we must learn more and know more about our bodies and invest heavily into our mental health to prevent a myriad of preventable diseases.

Paul explains that the great Australian dream and lifestyle is becoming unstuck and our perception of happiness is obscured by materialism. Australia, the lucky Country, is now the third highest medicated, popping a staggering 50 million happy pills per year just to get through the day. He asks why so many Australians are seeking death and destruction, when those in other nations, with so little, fight so hard to live? So before you go to sleep each night, Paul suggests we ask ourselves this question: "Today, did I move one step closer to the ideal me or one step further away?".

Over a series of sessions held on site at Oaky Creek Coal and at the Civic Centre in Tieri, Paul shared some confronting, but valuable stories from his paramedic work to reinforce the seriousness of lifestyle and mental health issues. They were based on real life, with real cases taken from the treating chair of an Ambulance, and delivered warts and all, with the number one message for everyone to look after your mental health.

As his website says, 1 in 2 Australians will suffer a mental health episode at least once in their lives, or as Paul puts it "if I'm not talking about you, I am most certainly talking about your partner, kids, friends or work colleagues."

Whether at home or work, Paul explained that we need to address our daily behaviours in a way that is not only life changing, but life saving and it is time to move away from yesterday's methods and focus on real solutions that will have a positive impact on the health and wellbeing of all Australians.
