A heartfelt thank you and congratulations to everyone who played a part in putting together these incredible celebrations of the history of our town, the mine and the community that has, and continues to call Tieri home. In case you missed them, here's a snapshot of some of the events that took place to mark our 40th anniversary.

FRIDAY 25TH AUGUST: Grand Opening and Tieri Book Launch

Over 300 people turned up to the Opening celebrations that kicked off at 10am on Friday 25th Aug at Tieri Shopping Centre. A Welcome to Country address was given by Jonno Malone, followed by a traditional dance from the Western Kangoulu people, upon whose lands on Tieri is situated.

It was the perfect launch to the festivities. The children loved the Traditional dances and embraced the opportunity to take part in one of them.

Free Tieri 40th merchandise was handed out to attendees and there were speeches by Damien Wynn,General Manager at Oaky Creek Coal (OCC), Joel May, Environment & Community Manager, OCC and author, Ray Christison who was commissioned by OCC to write a book documenting the 40 years of Tieri and Oaky Creek Coal.

Ray has done an incredible job capturing the history of Tieri in the 'Top Little Town' book. With so many wonderful photos and stories, it's a fabulous memoir of the mine, the town and the community, past and present. Copies of the book are available at the Tieri Town Services Office for \$10. All funds raised will be donated to the Cancer Council. A community copy has been provided to each of Tieri, Middlemount, Capella, Emerald and Queensland State Libraries for cataloguing into their local history section.

Tieri State School Captains formally opened the Tieri 40th Pop-Up Shop at the Community Space (see page 30), displaying memorabilia from the last four decades. The contents of the time capsule that was buried behind the Lions Wall during Tieri's 21st birthday celebrations was also on display. Unfortunately some of the contents had water damage, but it was still interesting to see the small signed quilt, CD ROMs, Cornett's Food Store catalogue, and more.

There was plenty of seating available within the space for people to sit and take their time viewing the hundreds of photos and items on display and remembering special moments in the history of Tieri and Oaky Creek mine. Katie Duncan and Kelly Barns dedicated so much time to create this sensory trip down memory lane for everyone to enjoy - thank you.

Thanks as well to Joyce Smith for cutting the 40th birthday cake on behalf of late partner, Graham Cooke. Graham was one of the first people involved in the construction of the Tieri township, so it was fitting for Joyce to honour his memory and contribution to Tieri at the 40th celebrations.

SPOTLIGHT ON...

WILDLIFE CARERS

Tieri Wildlife Carer: Naomi Jansen Started: I joined Central Highlands Wildlife Carers in 2019, but I've been doing this for a lot longer, about 15 years! Locations serviced: I service Tieri and Middlemount, but we have Wildlife Carers throughout the Central Highlands Follow on: www.facebook.com/centralhighlandswildlifecarers

Tell us a bit about you and how you came to be working with Central Highlands Wildlife Carers (CHWC)?

We moved here as a family in 2019. My husband works in mining. He was doing FIFO from our property in Victoria. We wanted to spend more time together, so we made the decision to move to Tieri.

I grew up with animals around me - everything from joeys and wombats to snakes and birds - so I've always had an interest in them and wanted to protect and care for them. This was really emphasised during and after the bushfires in VIC, where our property is a wildlife sanctuary.

So, when we moved to Tieri, I joined the Central Highlands Wildlife Carers group, and haven't looked back.

What does the CHWC group do?

We are a volunteer wildlife care and rehabilitation group operating throughout the Central Highlands, covering Emerald, Clermont, Moranbah, Dysart, Capella, Tieri, Gemfields and everywhere in between.

We network with other similar groups across the country, work with local vets and get a lot of experts even from places like Australia Zoo.

As a Not-For-Profit, we're entirely self-funded and rely heavily on grants and donations for the food and vet bills, which can be pretty high considering we care for an average of 500 animals each year.

What's a typical day like for you?

Well, we've literally just had a baby black-striped wallaby come in. It's Mum was hit earlier in the morning. Luckily a couple stopped, gently pulled the baby out and popped it into a little pouch and drove it here. Thankfully the baby is old enough to not have been attached to the teat.

What's the most important thing for people to be mindful of when they see an animal in distress?

Their safety, and the safety of others. The first thing I always ask is "are you safe?" because of the amount of traffic we have 24/7, especially with large trucks. Stopping for an animal sometimes isn't an option, but when people do stop, and I know they are safe, I ask if they can pull the animal off the road to help prevent any accidents.

What happens then?

They will either drop it off at my house in Tieri (depending on size) or I'll meet them at the location they found the animal.

I'll bring the injured or distressed animal back to the house and that's when the care begins. I'll weigh them, check for injuries,



bones and what the immediate need is, administer medical attention, warm them up, and then feed them as quickly as possible so that they're hydrating. Dehydration can actually be the biggest cause of loss so it's important we get fluids into them as soon as possible and keep that up. The feeding regime can be 4-hourly, throughout day and night so it's pretty intensive, especially when we have multiple animals in our care. Surprisingly though, it gets easier the more you have as you get into a bit of a routine.

I am a Reiki and Crystal Healer so it comes in handy and I give them a few sessions which really helps calm them. Just like humans, every little bit helps when they've been through a traumatic event.

Once the initial care and feed is complete, I make sure I document where the animal was found so that if/when we release them, we do so in the same area. This is particularly important for owls and echidnas.

Release only happens once they're stable, often months down the track. We often take a soft release approach which means we take them to a carer who has a property where wallabies and kangaroos can mob up. This is our ultimate goal: rescue, rehabilitate and release.

What's the best part about your job?

We're so lucky to have such a variety of wildlife here in Tieri from kangaroos to sugar gliders - we've just released two! That's definitely the best part of this role, when we're able to release an animal, that's why we do what we do and I love it.

But even having the privilege of caring for these tiny little creatures who are completely reliant on us is just beautiful. We've had our hearts broken a million times, but knowing we've helped them get through the trauma is fulfilling.

And also the sense of community when it comes to protecting our wildlife. Everyone plays a part in trying to save a little one's life and Tieri is SO good for that. My personal motto is *'every little life matters'*. We have so many beautiful people here in Tieri who feel the same and will stop to help a little life. To those people I say: you're the real heroes, thank you!

What's the most challenging part about your role?

The loss of habitat. It takes 100 years for a proper hollow of a tree to form, but that can be dropped in an instant if we cut down that tree or it gets damaged in a bushfire. That means the loss of a home for so many animals - we need to be more conscious of how we can help. For example, we're hoping to get a project off the ground in the coming months that will provide little nesting boxes for native wildlife, such as parrots, possums and sugar gliders.

We're also hoping to get involved with Tieri State School to develop an education program designed to increase children's awareness of Australian wildlife and how they can care for and protect our wildlife. For example, teaching them that possums aren't pests. If they're in your house, create a possum nesting box nearby to redirect the animal.

Do you have a favourite animal?

Emus. We have a resident emu here in Tieri, out past the laundry building turn-off. He's been around for a very long time. Every year he comes across and shows off his babies, typically up to 10 young per year!

Around a year ago a chap from the Glencore Oaky Creek mine called us about a little emu chick that he found who was all by himself. We called him Dave. He was tiny, just 40 grams. But the growth he had in a matter of days was phenomenal.

He lived with us in the backyard for about four months with a chicken called Delilah. Dave went everywhere Delilah went. He was such a character, very inquisitive like all emus. They'll rush towards you to see what you're doing.

When the time came for a soft release, we drove him to his new home - he had his head out the window the whole way, it was hysterical!

Are there any animals you're scared of?

Spiders! I'm also not so great with snakes but thankfully Tieri has got some fantastic snake handlers.

What's been your most difficult rescue?

Trying to get a wedge-tailed eagle into the car on my own. They're truly huge - they can often weigh between 3-4 kg and have a wingspan of over 2 metres! Luckily I had a big blanket in the boot so I was able to cover it with that, but it took a lot of time, effort and patience to do it.

What's your busiest time of year?

At this time of year, with the amount of ripe sorghum fields in the area, we get a lot of calls about barn owls. In the last two weeks alone we've had 17 owls that have sadly passed due to collisions with vehicles. It's almost impossible for a predatory bird with a broken wing to survive.

Generally speaking, spring is definitely the busiest season, and also when we have dry summers.

With Spring, comes magpie season. Everyone will be familiar with the magpie in the Lions park. The best thing to do is just leave them alone. It's only 3-4 weeks so try to avoid the park at that time whilst they protect their chicks. Signs will be put up so you'll know when it's in season.

As a backup, you can contact me on our Facebook page or even send a message on the Tieri Noticeboard Facebook page. Whichever method you use, I can give you advice straight away.

What are your top tips on how people can help care for our wildlife?

- 1. If you see an injured animal...call us on 0475 288 301 and we'll talk you through the next steps.
- 2. If the animal is on the road...first make sure you're safe. Then, only if it's safe to do so, pull the animal from the road and check the pouch. Remember they are wild animals so approach with caution, especially in a trauma.
- **3.** If you see a koala on the ground...that's often not a good sign, so call us.
- 4. If you see an echidna in your backyard...please don't move it yourself. It will have a den somewhere nearby so it's important not to displace it. Lock your dog inside for 5-10 mins the echidna will move on and find its own way back to its den.
- 5. If you see an injured bird...pop it in a ventilated box and leave it alone in a quiet area. Give it around 30 mins and then slowly open up the box. Nine times out of 10 it will fly back out again. If it doesn't, contact us on 0475 288 301.
- 6. Practice responsible pet ownership...keep your cats and dogs inside at night they're the biggest contributors to wildlife injuries and loss.
- 7. Slow down at dusk and dawn...these are the main times kangaroos are out so slow down a little on the road.
- 8. Don't let your dog chase a roo…even if it doesn't catch them, the chase itself can actually cause death through myopathy which is when the roo is so stressed out, its body goes into a sort of state of shock and it literally drops dead. It can take weeks and is an extremely painful way to die.
- **9.** In the hotter months...leave containers of water out for the wildlife, somewhere away from the house and any pets.
- **10. Be mindful of the beautiful wildlife around us...**remember that we're in their home, not the other way around.

The event kicked off at 8am with a full day of rodeo events, before the main performance at 6pm with a near full capacity grandstand to take in the spectacle.


The Glencore big screen provided an

LOCAL VOICES: Tieri, Your Voice Matters

Understanding how our local community feels is critical to the health and long term success of a mining town like Tieri. Which is why, back in 2020, Glencore's Oaky Creek Coal engaged Voconiq to run their community engagement program: 'Local Voices'.

Local Voices is a series of anonymous, confidential surveys that provide anyone over the age of 18 and living or working in Tieri and surrounds with the opportunity to express their thoughts, opinions, ideas and experiences on a range of topics relating to Oaky Creek's mining operations and its relationship with the community of Tieri.

To encourage as many people as possible to have their say, the survey can be completed online, anywhere and anytime during the survey period.

Oaky Creek Coal uses the responses and community insights from each of these surveys in their decision-making, strategic planning and their investment and resource allocations.

"We want everyone to know that their voice is heard," says Kate French, Environment & Community Advisor at Oaky Creek. "We might not always have the answer straight away, and we might not be able to solve or resolve every issue, but I can guarantee you that we always read every single response and every single comment and take them all into consideration when making decisions."

The Local Voices surveys began in Dec 2020 – Jan 2021 with a detailed 'anchor' survey to get a baseline understanding of the key drivers of trust among the community. This anchor survey has been followed by a series of 'pulse' surveys to track changes in community sentiment over time. Pulse surveys were conducted in July 2021, Dec 2021 – Jan 2022 and, most recently, in Dec 2022 – Jan 2023.

The surveys help us understand what's on your mind and what matters to you most," says Kate. "Armed with these insights we can determine the most appropriate course of action.

For example, in the most recent survey responses, we could see that 50% of respondents were neutral on whether Oaky Creek listens to and respects your opinions on community issues. This tells us two things. Firstly, we have some work to do in promoting the various ways in which you can share your views. And secondly, we can do a better job of closing the loop on how we've taken your feedback on board."

Procedural Fairness

It's been fantastic to celebrate that at the 2023 Central Highlands Business Excellence Awards Night.

Jodie: It feels really exciting! I never expected that I would even be nominated for these types of awards. We've been nominated for industry awards (brow and lash) before, but these can often be swept under the carpet as being a 'hobby'. It's incredible to be recognised from a business perspective. To those people who nominated Aurora, from the depths of my heart, thank you so much. What's your journey been like so far, to get your business to this point?

Jamie-Lee: Rewarding. I knew when the doors opened I'd give it my all. But I can't take all the credit for how amazing this salon is. Every client I have whether it's here in Tieri or the surrounding towns, that's what makes it so rewarding. Opening a salon and working with my sister has always been a dream. She is the feta to my bruschetta!

Who has been instrumental in your journey?

Jamie-Lee: My husband, Brodie. He is the most patient man in the world. Giving me the opportunity to work my heart out while he is at home with our little boy, Kobe. Being a working mum is a lot but he was the strength I need and is my biggest supporter. I am truly blessed.

Why did you start your business?

Jodie: As part of the Awards process we were asked why we do what we do, what drives us. For me, part of this is helping people to see the beauty they already have, to boost their confidence, which in turn helps exude beauty. But it's also about providing a safe space for people to take some self-care. To vent, share, speak about their struggles, or to forget about them for a bit. Either way, I want people to know they're not alone. We're here. Self care isn't frivolous, it's proven to be important to good mental health. Especially in rural towns, where suicide rates can be double that of a major city. Whether it's domestic violence, cancer, a miscarriage, divorce, I'm often the first person people speak to about these massive, life changing events. I want to do everything in my power to always provide that safe space, and be that safe person for people to take some self-care.


Jodie, what does it mean to you personally, and for your business to win the 2023 Sole Trader Business Excellence award?

Jodie: It means so many things, on multiple levels. Mainly, it's recognition of seven years of hard work and dedication to build a legitimate, successful business. My focus now is to use this as a platform to bring mental health awareness to light. Even if you have anxiety and depression, like me, you can still achieve amazing things. It doesn't need to define you.

What have you learnt about yourself and about running a business during this process?

Jamie-Lee: Just being recognised as a small business doing what I love is enough for me. This opportunity gave me a nudge to stop and think about how I would like to run Koa Hair and build a business plan to keep me on track. It's an incredible feeling to know how lucky I am to be in such a supportive and uplifting town like this. Every day I look forward to going to work and treating our beautiful guests.

Jodie: It's been a really insightful process that's helped me realise the importance of setting healthy work boundaries and how to set them. It's important to look after our own mental health no matter how busy we are! It has also been a really educational experience in terms of employment and different job roles. For example, I'm now considering employing a non-beautician for general duties such as reception, stocktake, etc. that frees me up to see more clients. I've learned how to take a step back and be proud of my achievements. To stop looking at myself as 'just' a beautician and to start seeing myself as the business person and entrepreneur that I've grown to be.



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Karaoke is coming to town TIERI BROLGA HOTEL

Named after the bird, Tieri Brolga Hotel has been a fixture on Tieri's social scene since the mid-80s. Today, under the management of Cheryl Tabone, the pub is expanding its offering.

"Tieri is more than just a town, it's a community," says Cheryl. "We want to make the pub a place where all members of the community, including children, can come for some food and drink whilst spending time with their friends and family."

Cheryl arrived in Tieri in August 2021. She moved here from Brisbane to be with family. She started work at the pub as Duty Manager shortly after arriving and quickly moved into the role of Manager.

"I'd only been here for eight weeks when it was the town Christmas party. I remember walking to the toilets and saying hello and having a quick chat with more people than if I'd gone to an event back in Brisbane where I'd been living for the last 10 years. That sums Tieri up for me - everyone is so friendly. If anyone asks for help, people will always be there."

It's this sense of community that's driving Cheryl to make the pub more family friendly. Top of the list to make this happen is to bring karaoke to town!

"We're still working out the details but the goal is to give the town something fun to do, early in the evening so the kids can come along too. We want the kids to sing their favourite songs and the adults to...you could even get the whole family singing along together!"

Karaoke nights will be a regular feature on the pub's weekly events calendar, along with:

Tuesdays: Meat Raffle - you can buy your tickets any time, just pop into the pub or the bottle shop any day of the week. Winners are drawn at 8pm Tuesday night. If you're not there, Cheryl and the team will call you to let you know you've won.

Thursdays: Steak Night - get a 300g rump steak, with chips, salad and your choice of sauce for only \$19.90 (dine in only).

Fridays: 'Jag the Joker' - get a raffle ticket with every transaction. Pick a card and win a prize. All cards have a small prize attached to them so you're guaranteed to win something. But if you pick the Joker, you win the cash jackpot of \$50 or more. "If it doesn't get picked, it rolls over to the following week," explains Cheryl. "The biggest cash prize we've ever given away was over \$2,000!"

Sundays: Free Pool - challenge the kids or your mates to a game of pool.



"We're also hoping to hold more Sunday afternoon live music sessions so the kids can come too," says Cheryl.

"We've recently had Derek Smith and Big Pups play here. Sunday afternoons work well - the kids can run around out the back but everyone can still be home early enough for work and school the next day."

With so much going on, Cheryl's grateful for her *"hard-working and supportive"* team: Misty, Madison, Tracey, Jill and Emma who has recently left but played a big role at the pub, and Christina who recently joined as Duty Manager after arriving in Tieri with her family.

In June 2023, Tieri Medical Practice & Physiotherapy was taken over by Heart of Australia under a joint initiative with Atticus Health. We spoke with them to find out what their plans are for the Practice and the services it provides to Tieri.

What can you tell us about the Heart of Australia?

Heart of Australia provides equal access to specialist healthcare for Australians living in rural and remote communities. We deliver medical specialists and their equipment onboard our fit-for-purpose mobile health clinics – the Heart Trucks – ensuring country Australians are given an equal chance at living a long and healthy life.

What's your goal for Tieri's Medical Practice & Physiotherapy?

Our aim is to bring together the strengths of General Practice (through Atticus Health) and the specialist services of Heart of Australia to create an integrated, gold-standard medical clinic that supports mine workers and the wider Tieri community.

- Overnight Holter monitoring to record your heart rate and rhythm
- Spirometry to assess how well your lungs work
- Complex lung function testing.

The Tieri Town Services Team works hard to keep our top little town in 'top' shape. From maintenance at the various community facilities; Shopping, Civic and Rec Centres, Pool Complex and preparing houses for new families arriving to Tieri, the team is always busy behind the scenes.

We checked in with Roger Decker, Town Services Superintendent, to see what he and his colleagues, Candice Stewart (Town Services Coordinator), Joshua Fleming (Town Maintenance Coordinator) and Alex Cadena (Town Services Administrator), have been focusing on lately.

Replaced Oval Flood Lights

The lighting towers at Football Oval 1 "Langerak Park" have had a birthday and the old defective flood lights have been replaced with brand new LED flood lights. (LED flood lights use less energy and require less maintenance).

There are four, 23 metre high lighting towers at the Oval. On each Tower, there were five to seven original defective flood lights which have now been replaced with three high-performance LED flood lights.

They're all working well and allowed the Peak Downs Pirates rugby league team to play their last two home games under lights, which was enjoyed by a large number of local spectators, and the new lights came in very handy for the final event of Tieri's 40th anniversary celebrations: the Live Music and Fireworks (see page 14). "The new lights make the Oval accessible during night time hours, whether it's a training night or competition game for our local footy team, or for a big community event, or Monday night Ultimate Frisbee," says Roger.

Excitingly, more people are choosing to move into town. Over the last few years we've continued to see more people arriving than leaving. Town Services have been busy preparing additional houses.

"Currently, we have 406 occupied houses, with another 28 houses planned for occupation this year. That's the highest it's been for many years," explains Roger.

"It's great to see the town filling up as people realise what a top little town we have here in Tieri. It helps of course that the rent is subsidised, there are so many great benefits of living here, especially for young families with primary school aged children."

An influx of residents has a positive ripple effect throughout the town, especially for the local school and for local businesses.

"All our Town Centre shops are now tenanted with a great range of local businesses which is fantastic! The newest addition is the new Community Space (see page 30) which is now fitted out with 40 years of history and memorabilia and provides a location for community groups' events and classes, as well as pop-up retail shops."


Protecting our Top Little Town - Wildfire Mitigation

During the first week of August, a coordinated and controlled hazard reduction burn was conducted in a joint initiative with the Department of Land - Fire Team, QFES Tieri, CHRC and supported by Oaky Creek Holdings.

The burns took place in the Asset Protection Zones which are the bushland areas directly behind the residential houses and the main fire break. This assists to protect the town in the event of a wildfire.

"The aim of a hazard reduction burn is to reduce the potential fuel load in the area so, in the case of a wildfire, we can manage it more efficiently and effectively," explains Roger, who is a member of Tieri's Fire Service.

EVERETT HARRIS Represents Tieri in Junior Opens

Nine-year-old Everett Harris is the sole junior member of the Tieri Golf Club. Over the last few months, he has been representing Tieri in the Junior Open Championships around the Central Highlands.

We spoke to Everett and his Dad, Boff (aka Jonathan), about the experience, the game of golf, and why more juniors should get involved in the sport.

When did you first start playing golf? Everett: When I was three. I've been playing for six years now.

Does golf run in the family?

Boff: Yes, all of the Harris family enjoy golf. My Uncles and Aunties have always been into golf, so it's a bit of a "Rite of Passage" growing up to always have some sort of golf discussions going on within the family.

When did you realise Everett was a good golfer?

Boff: When we finally got him some clubs that were his size! He had been playing with a cut-down set that were a bit heavy for him, but once he got a correctly sized set he was away.

Now his short game is getting really good, so when we go head-tohead while practising, I've really got to concentrate because each time he beats me he doesn't let me forget it!

What's it been like watching him compete in the Junior Open Championships?

Boff: It's been a very proud couple of months for us. He's played the Blackwater and Dysart 3-hole competitions where he placed 2nd and 1st, respectively. Then we moved him up to the 6-hole competition for Moranbah and Tieri. In Moranbah he was runner up in the 6-hole Nett division and at Tieri he won the 6-hole Nett division. He won a tray of golf balls that was presented to him by Wayne Trenerry, the Tieri Greenskeeper, that he was really stoked with!

Not only has he placed very well in all his competitions, he has fantastic sportsmanship qualities that really come out on the golf course. I'm more proud of him for that, than I am his golf.

How does it feel to represent Tieri at the Junior Open Championships?

What is it about the sport that you enjoy?

Everett: Going for Chip-in's and Eagles. I can't hit big enough yet to get an Eagle, but I still try!

What's your top golfing tip?

Everett: When Chipping, never have the ball in the middle of your stance. Always have it on your front foot or your back foot, depending on the shot you want to play.

What's been the best course you've played so far?

Everett: Playing golf on Rottnest Island with all the Quokkas jumping around. It felt like there were more Quokkas on the Rotty golf course than there are kangaroos in Tieri!

How often do you play golf?

Everett: Every weekend if I can, and during the school holidays. And Dad and I have chipping competitions on our front lawn all the time. I've beaten him HEAPS and I like reminding him of that!

Boff: It's not been that many times, Buddy, only three!

Do you have any more competitions coming up?

Everett: The Central Highlands Junior Open in Emerald on 14th October will be my last competition for the year.

If you could play a round of golf against anyone in the world, who would it be and why?

Everett: My Dad, because I really want to beat him! And Cam Smith, because he's a Queenslander like me and his chipping and putting is AWESOME and I want to be that good!

You're the only junior member of the Tieri Golf Club what would you say to any other children who might be thinking about getting into golf?



CAPELLA STATE HIGH More Than Just A School

As Tieri celebrates 40 years, many of its residents have either grown up in the area or have chosen to raise their families here. In that time, Capella State High School has provided the educational home for Tieri residents and their children...and even their children's children!

Tieri News spoke to Principal, Gerowyn Lacaze, about the role the school has played in supporting the Tieri community over the last four decades.



First Formal Assembly

When did Capella State High School (CSHS) open its doors?

Originally, it opened as the secondary department of Capella State School back in 1984. Capella State High became a school in its own right at the beginning of 1989.

On average, how many students do you have at the school?

Enrolment numbers have fluctuated with the youth population of the towns. At one stage we reached 300 students! Most recently, enrolment numbers have sustained at around 150 students in Years 7 to 12.

And how many staff?

We have a wonderful team of people who are all passionate about making the school a safe, enjoyable and engaging place to learn. Our academic team consists of 13 Teachers, two Deans, six Teacher Aides, and a range of Support Staff.

We have a strong focus on youth engagement at Capella High, so we also have a dedicated Student Services team made up of our Guidance Officer, School Chaplain, Heads of Year, and a Youth Pathways Coordinator.

Every single member of the team plays a crucial role in the success of our school and our students. I'm extremely grateful for the effort and commitment they give and would like to say a big thank you to them all.

Which local areas does the school serve? Capella, Tieri, and surrounds

What are the founding principles (or values) of the school?

Success, teamwork, attitude, and respect

How do you bring these to life for your students?

Our Students First framework takes a proactive approach to facilitating connections between students and their school, the community, and their educational outcomes.

It places emphasis on wellbeing and recognises that school is far more than simply a place of instruction. School is central to our young people's daily lives.

How do rural schools like Capella differ from schools in a big town or city?

As a school committed to maintaining small class sizes, we know every single young person in our school. They're not just a number to us. This means we can focus on delivering a personalised learning experience for every student's individual goals.

What are you most proud of about your school?

There's so much I'm proud of, from our Personal Growth program that focuses on social skills and practical life education, to our annual arts performance, contemporary music lessons, district sporting competitions, student council, and our Recreational Enrichment program. We work hard to help every student to unearth and explore their passion, whatever it may be.

Tieri is celebrating 40 years this year. When you reflect on the town and its community, what stands out for you?

That Tieri is such a great place to raise kids, offering them the freedom of a childhood in the bush. That and how our country teenagers are highly approachable, open, and honest. I'm really proud of them.

"It takes a village to raise a child"...what role does CSHS play in the 'villages' you support, including Tieri? Our school exists for the young people of both Tieri and Capella, with

Our range of curriculum goes beyond what one would expect. From traditional academic excellence such as Biology in our fully equipped labs and Agricultural Science on our student-run ag plot, to practical pathways like Hospitality in our commercial venue the Country Cookhouse - or film and television with our industry equipment. We aim to expose our students to as diverse a range of learning opportunities as possible to equip them with the knowledge and skills to succeed, whatever path they choose.

How has CSHS evolved over the last four decades, to ensure it continues to provide the best educational experience for students and staff alike?

Technology, in particular since Covid, plays a significant role in 21st century teaching and learning. With our 1:1 iPad scheme, all students have a device, and all learning materials are available to them from anywhere, at any time.

Our modern classrooms feature large interactive TouchBoards, and our teachers are focused on developing skills of research and critical evaluation.

How do you work with your strategic partners to enhance the school experience?

We're fortunate to have a wider variety of partners that bring further depth of experience and expertise to our school and students.

Our industry partnerships offer students outstanding opportunities, including with Glencore—a significant contributor to our school, most recently investing in establishing a school radio station with a state-of-the-art broadcast studio.

Our community partnerships facilitate programs such as our Cattle Club and our social and emotional wellbeing programs (one of which is delivered by CTM Links). Our local business partnerships offer wide-ranging volunteer and work experience placements.

And our academic partnerships enable our students to start university while still at school.

What does the future look like for the school?

Our school continues to grow and transform with our students. We are constantly adapting our offerings to suit our young people's interests and futures.

We're expanding our at-capacity contemporary music program, extending our agricultural curriculum with the introduction of aquaponics, rolling out a new web-based learning system, and growing our rugby, netball and volleyball inter-school tournaments.

For families who have just arrived in Tieri, or for those who might be considering a move to Tieri, what would you like them to know about CSHS?

We are one of the highest performing schools in the region in terms of student effort, behaviour, and academic results. Choose your local high school - a small school with enormous opportunities.

MEET THE LOCALS... Kath Hema

Tieri Community Development Officer at CTM LINKS

Where was home before Tieri?

I was born and bred in Winton, a small country town in outback Queensland.

In 1986, we moved to Emerald. And I actually lived in Tieri for a short while in my early 20s and travelled to Emerald for work. At the time I remember thinking 'this really isn't for me'...but life clearly had other ideas!

I met my husband, Terry, in Emerald in 1997. We were both ready to go on adventure so we packed up, flipped a coin to determine our direction and spent the next two years working and travelling through many parts of Southern and Western Australia.

> In 1999 work opportunities brought us back to Emerald and in 2004, Terry was given the opportunity of a 'fulltime crank' with Oaky Creek Coal at Oaky North, so we moved here and Tieri became our home.

You've been in Tieri for 20 years half its life - what changes have you seen in that time?

I endearingly refer to Tieri as a 'Big Old Snake' because it is constantly shedding and growing new skin. People come and go often. Primarily because it offers a great, safe place to grow a family. People stay here until children reach the end of primary school, at which point they tend to get drawn towards the coast or a bigger town where there's more schooling options and extracurricular activities.

The upside is there's an eternal vibrance here. With new energy comes enthusiasm, hope, and the desire to be engaged in something. The downside is the social isolation that can occur when you are raising your child/ren away from your family and network of friends. You can feel a sense of disconnection. Helping people create a new network and promote a sense of community is the biggest part of my job.

Speaking of your job, you're a Community Development Officer for CTM LINKS in Tieri...what does that involve?

Our organisation identifies itself as a Neighbourhood Centre. The position of Community Development Officers (CDO) is a multipronged role. We're here to provide a safe space for people to come; we are an Information Centre for people, especially those new to town; we are a referral pathway service for those who might need assistance; and we bring about social cohesion with events and activities that bring people together and create opportunities for connection. In my profession we describe ourselves as the "knitters"...we knit people together to help them create their community.

I love the 'ground-up' community development aspect of my role: empowering people to develop the community they want. For example, if someone shares with me a desire to see a certain event, initiative or group be established in the community, I work with them to help map that out, create a viable plan, apply for grants if needed and connect them with people who can help bring that vision to life. We did this last year with the Colour Run for Janice.

How do you define a community?

For me, community is about feeling part of something, then wanting to extend yourself to grow that sense of 'something' for the benefit of not only yourself, but also for your loved ones and the greater good of the people around you within that 'community'.



It's also about truly 'seeing' others and connection and engagement at every level. I learnt this from my Dad and will always be grateful that he instilled the importance of belonging and community.

Have you always been in a community service role?

No, I haven't. For most of my working life I've been a bookkeeper/ administrator for small businesses.

In 2016, I took some time off and - as luck would have it - someone recommended attending a 'Wheel of Wellbeing' workshop in Capella. I was blown away by this evidence-based framework that aims to increase your capacity for happiness and enhance your general wellbeing.

That led me down a whole new career path and I became a 'Wheel of Wellbeing' Accredited Practitioner. It was my first introduction to 'community work' and I realised that was where I wanted to be. In 2018 an administrative role with CTM links came up which aligned with the direction I was going. Then, in 2020, I was given the opportunity to fill the role as Tieri CDO and I haven't looked back since.

What draws you to this line of work... why do you do it?

Both my husband and I grew up in small towns. We have great memories of growing up in a small community and the sense of freedom, belonging and safety that comes with it.

We've been fortunate enough to have our own family and been able to provide that same upbringing to them.

I do what I do to try and help people enjoy and benefit from that same sense of community here in Tieri.

If you weren't doing this, what do you think you would be doina?

I'm fascinated by neuroscience so if I had a start over, perhaps I'd be a psychologist.

One thing I am yet to achieve is to be a Qigong (pronounced "Cheegong") instructor. Qigong is an ancient Chinese healing practice that's similar to Tai Chi. It's about tuning in and connecting to the energy (chi) within yourself and using it to generate energy and vitality.

You've recently been part of the Tieri 40th Organising Committee. What was a stand out moment for you during the celebrations?

It was all a stand-out! The events and activities were aimed at engaging and capturing as broad a demographic of our community as possible. From sporting events to craft events, to family events,



to memorabilia, and even a continuous miner display. We had so much to offer.

However, if I had to pick one from an event perspective, the highlight was probably the music festival on the last night (see page 14). The whole point of the 40th was to celebrate Tieri past and present. The music festival felt like Tieri of old, it was incredible. There's a lot of nostalgia in the footy fields, so for people to go back to their old 'stomping ground' brought back heaps of fond memories. To have Dragon and The Angels - two legendary Australian rock bands playing at our 'top little town', was mind-blowing! And to see two homegrown artists - one of which was our son - supporting them, well, it was a proud moment all round! It was the perfect way to end the celebrations and something that will stay with me forever.

Overall. I think we honoured Tieri well.

How would your mates describe you?

Passionate (to a fault at times).

How do you spend your spare time...and with whom?

Terry and I love camping and exploring. Every year we plan a big trip with life-long friends to explore somewhere new and go on an adventure. We typically like to go remote - somewhere like Cape York, Flinders Range, Savannah Way or the Simpson Desert - and truly switch off.

Aside from that, my favourite thing to relax is to go bush walking out in the surroundings of Tieri with my dog, Abe.

Dead or alive, who would be your ideal BBQ guest?

My Dad, for sure - I miss him tremendously. And my husband's Dad, I never had the chance to meet him and I think we would have liked each other. Besides that, my family! Both mine and Terry's. It would be loud, witty, and maybe slightly obnoxious, but it would be filled with masses of laughter.

Since then, the Grassroots Support of Mining Women initiative has grown to include



The 40+ participants enjoyed a jam-packed agenda featuring Tania Steel, Danielle Duell (CEO, People With Purpose) and special guest speaker, Sarah Mundell, a holistic health professional and qualified Yogi, Clinical Nutritionist and Wholefoods Chef.

In her first session, Sarah led participants through an outdoor 'Mindful Movement' program. Later, Sarah explored the pillars of health, including movement, mindfulness, nutrition and community, explaining how each of these areas can positively impact mental health and our ability to thrive.



There were meaningful discussions around the small, sustainable shifts that can have a profound impact on our wellbeing and plenty of questions were asked as attendees sought to develop their knowledge and understand practical ways to improve their wellbeing.

The session wrapped up with a look at the many RUOK? Resources available and how to put them into practice, including how to ask someone if they are OK.

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INDIGENOUS PATHWAYS PROGRAM Opens the Door to a Brighter Future

For over four years, the Glencore Indigenous Employment Pathways Program has been blazing a trail of opportunity in the NSW Upper Hunter and Central Queensland Regions.

From its inaugural launch in Tieri in 2018, where Oaky Creek Coal and DBS orchestrated a pilot program, to its current evolution in 2023, the Pathways Program has been sowing the seeds of change and fostering a brighter future for Indigenous Australians.

We asked Brian French, Manager Approvals and Cultural Heritage (QLD) at Glencore, to tell us more... This program isn't just about jobs; it's about forging pathways to a brighter future.

The core mission of the Pathways Program is to provide job readiness training and work experience for Indigenous Australians connected to or living near our operational areas in Central Queensland and the Upper Hunter of NSW.

Spanning two phases, the Pathways Program offers a structured approach to training and work experience:

- **Phase 1 12 weeks:** the focus is on getting participants ready for the mining industry, covering inductions, civil training, and lifestyle preparation.
- **Phase 2 14 weeks:** participants gain work experience in designated roles on site. This hands-on experience aims to make participants job-ready and equipped for potential employment beyond the program's duration.

Paving the Way Forward

Over 130 participants across both states have been engaged in the Program since its commencement, with a majority of participants who completed the full 26-week program having successfully transitioned into full-time work, either at Glencore sites, other mining companies or in different industries.

Although the Program doesn't guarantee full-time employment, its track record speaks to its effectiveness in facilitating these transitions.

In 2023, a group of 16 participants, primarily based in Clermont, spent five weeks at Oaky Creek Coal mine and Tieri, providing them valuable insights into the mine's operations.

This included a comprehensive tour of surface operations and exposure to Oaky Creek's rehabilitation works.

Participants also had the chance to take an underground tour, providing them with firsthand experience of underground development and operations.

Unforgettable Underground Experience

One standout participant from this year's Indigenous Pathways Program is Nicole Storey, who is currently completing her Phase 2 work experience at Glencore's Oaky North underground operation.

Nicole's choice to pursue this experience was influenced by her exposure to the Oaky Creek underground operations, and thanks to Clint Cody and his team for making the underground tour happen.



Glencore's Environment & Community Teams FLOCK TO OAKY CREEK

Every quarter, the Environment & Community teams from across Glencore Coal Queensland all get together for a two-day meeting at one of Glencore's QLD operations. In July 2023, it was Oaky Creek Coal's turn to host.

The 25 attendees included Environment & Community representatives from Collinsville, Hail Creek, Clermont, Rolleston, Valeria, Wandoan sites, as well as Corporate Managers and Support Staff from Brisbane and Newcastle. The GCAA Environment & Community Graduates also attended the meeting to gain experience and site exposure as part of their two-year Graduate Program.

The meeting was an opportunity for the Oaky Creek Coal Environment & Community (E&C) team to showcase their current projects and share their learnings. They gave an update on the OCC Progressive Rehabilitation & Closure Plan (PRCP), water management procedures and system upgrades, drone rehabilitation monitoring techniques and tailings reprocessing.

Although our sites are separated geographically, much of what we do from an environment and community perspective is somewhat similar at each site - for example, water management, waste management, rehabilitation processes, stakeholder engagement, and so on. So it's a good opportunity for collaboration, sharing best practices and working together to tackle any challenges," explains Kate French, Environment & Community Advisor at Oaky Creek.

The two-day meeting also included a site tour to allow the other E&C teams to see first hand how Oaky Creek Coal (OCC) operates and their rehabilitation efforts and successes.



"Nothing can bring on rain like planning an outdoor event or, in our case, a bus site tour of the Surface Operations!" said Kate.

Due to the rain, the surface road network was closed, so a plan B was quickly organised.

"Fortunately, the Oaky North team is amazing and managed to organise the necessary visitor inductions, PPE and transport to make an underground site tour happen at the very last minute. I was so grateful - arranging the necessary requirements for that many visitors at short notice is both dedicated and very impressive, thank you all!"

The visitors saw the Longwall Automation Control Room on the surface and were able to experience a trip underground. Turning off their cap lamps they got to experience first hand just how dark it is in an underground mine.

"The visit underground turned out to be the highlight of the day," reflected Kate. "As the only underground coal mine in the Glencore Coal Queensland's Operations, it's not something that many people get to experience in their regular work day."

It wasn't all work. The guests enjoyed an amazing dinner at Tieri Bar & Grill and an overnight stay in Tieri accommodation. They also visited the newly completed Tieri Community Space and all commented that it's a great resource for the community.

"A big shout out to Stephen, Raewyn and the team at Tieri Bar & Grill," says Kate. "The meeting room worked perfectly and everyone commented on how wonderful the food was - thank you!"

Planning for the Future OF OAKY CREEK COAL

As reported in previous editions of Tieri News, Oaky Creek Coal's Environment & Community team has been developing the mine's Progressive Rehabilitation and Closure Plan (PRCP) since June 2022.

The PRCP is a legal requirement that explains how Glencore will rehabilitate the land on which Oaky Creek Coal operates to return it to a 'stable condition' when the mine closes, currently scheduled for 2029.

This means that upon closure of Oaky Creek, all minerelated land disturbance must be:

- Deemed safe, structurally stable, non-polluting and sustainable,
- Rehabilitated to a suitable Post-Mining Land Use (PMLU), or
- Identified and managed as a Non-Use Management Area (NUMA). A NUMA is land that is safe, structurally stable and non-polluting, however it cannot sustain a PMLU in the long term. A NUMA can only be proposed once all PMLU options have been assessed.

The PRCP contains two parts:

- A written report with research, analysis, technical studies, justification and evidence to support the proposed PMLU or NUMA, closure criteria and rehabilitation methodologies; and
- A schedule which is essentially a timeline for completion of the proposed rehabilitation. Once approved, this is a statutory document that legally must be adhered to.

Throughout the development of the PRCP, the E&C team has consistently consulted with and sought feedback from relevant members of the community, including local landholders, council and State Government and Traditional Owners regarding the closure of the mine and potential post-mining land uses (PMLU).

In August, Environment & Community Manager, Joel May, again met with various groups including representatives of the Oaky Creek Joint Venture Partners – Sumisho and Itochu, and representatives of the Western Kangoulu People on whose land the majority of Oaky Creek and all of Tieri resides.

The purpose of these sessions were to take each group through the PRCP process so far and the timeline for submission; the Environmental Authority (EA) amendment application and subsequent Information Request from the DES; the landform design process and analysis of different options; the proposed post-mining land uses (PMLUs) and PRCP schedule; and the rehabilitation management methodologies for voids, spoil dumps, out-of-pit TSFs, the underground area, the built infrastructure and revegetation.

The PMLUs Oaky Creek is proposing include:

- **Grazing** where land will support light grazing as per the surrounding environment.
- Open woodland (or 'Terrestrial Ecosystem Services') where land will predominantly consist of established open woodland vegetation and include secondary potential uses of light grazing, fauna habitat and recreation.
- Wetland areas (or 'Aquatic Ecosystem Services') land where water naturally accumulates or 'ponds'.
- Ecosystem Services (Ephemeral Waterways) creeks and diversions of creeks that support a shortterm waterway in a manner and condition similar to surrounding areas.
- Non-Use Management Areas (NUMAs) land that is unable to support a PMLU long tem. A proposed 1% (89 hectares out of a total of 6,770 hectares) of the final landform will be left as a NUMA.

Feedback and questions from the sessions and the details shared included interest in further information provided in the PRCP documentation, protecting and maintaining culturally and environmentally significant areas, and involvement in closure activities.

The PRCP is due for submission to the Department of Environment and Science (DES) for regulatory approval on 16th November 2023. Between now and then, the E&C team will be consulting with other interest groups including the Tieri Community Reference Group, DES and local neighbouring landholders.

HAPPY RETIREMENT, DESSY!

After 28 years with Oaky Creek, Des "Dessy" O'Connell has retired!

Dessy is 'the last original' Oaky North employee. He was there at the very start when Oaky North started operating on Monday, 11th September, 1995.

"It was a bit scary," Dessy reflects. "I didn't know anyone. But I've always remembered the General Manager at the time, a guy called Neville Powell, who told us that the only ones who could make this mine work - and be a success - was us...and that's still true today. There were only 19 of us back then though, there's hundreds at Oaky North now."

Dessy has been a coal miner for over half a century. He first went underground in 1967 when he was just 16 years old. *"They just gave me a hat and a lamp and that was it, there was no training at all! Not like today when you get well looked after."*

At Oaky North, Dessy was often the one that looked after others. He worked as an Operator and trained so many people throughout their careers, including current General Manager and Senior Site Executive, Damien Wynn, who worked with Dessy during his time underground as a Graduate.

Dessy describes working underground as "dusty, noisy and wet" so traimportant to take each day at a time and look after each other because the people you work with make all the difference.

I've got to work with some fantastic people over the years. People like Craig Clarke who first hired me, and Peter Lynch, the first mine manager here who sadly got killed in a plane crash a few years ago. He did a lot to change the way mines operated. Todd Johnson, Jimmy Flett and Sylvio 'Silver' Coppo...and the crew over the last couple of years have all been fantastic. Mostly it's them that I'll miss, the people I worked with day in, day out."

Asked how times have changed, Dessy explained that when he first started it was a Monday to Friday roster, with weekends off and everyone lived in the town. *"FIFO and DIDO changed that, but Oaky North has always been a great place to work and Tieri a great place for our family. I've really enjoyed my time here. I'm 72 now, I could have retired years ago but I was having too much fun!"*

There are far too many moments of that really stand out as career highlights for Dessy are starting a new mine on that September day 28 years ago and Tuesday, 5th September 2023 - the day he retired and was surprised by his workmates with a farewell celebration.

"They said it was just going to be a bit of a luncheon, but then my wife and daughter turned up, there were bagpipes, a march through town and speeches. I was very touched."

One of the people who gave a speech at Dessy's farewell was Clint Cody, Production Manager at Oaky Creek. "I got quite emotional. Dessy is synonymous with Oaky North. When you think of Oaky North, you can't help but think of him, so we're naturally sad to see him go. But mostly we're so happy for him that he gets to spend more time with his family.

Even in his 70s, Dessy is still one of the hardest working people I know. And the most humble. Nothing is ever an issue for him, or too much trouble. He always turns up, ready to get stuck in."

Fred Farrar, Longwall Mining Supervisor at OCC, agrees. "I have known Des for 14 years. During these years, he has been the hardest worker I have ever met and he is the most humble person I have had the pleasure of knowing. His send off from site was something I will probably never see again in my career. It showed the true calibre of Des and how much everyone likes and respects him. They don't make them like him anymore."

"Dessy's retirement will leave a massive gap in the longwall where he works, and in the business overall," said Clint. "Thankfully, he's mentored countless people across Oaky Creek so his knowledge and his work ethic is deep-rooted throughout so many of us. We all aspire to be like him!"

Dessy, thank you for everything, mate. We all wish you the best and hope you enjoy your well-earned retirement!"
